Barbershop Fours Warming Up for Forest Grove Sing

FOREST GROVE, Ore. (Special)—Barbershop quartettes and quartets will warble in Forest Grove next February 23-24-25 to celebrate the tenth anniversary of the nationally-known All-Northwest Barber Shop Ballad contest and Gay Nineties festival.

The colorful songfest was started nearly ten years ago as a one-day one-shot contest by the Forest Grove Gleemen. The event proved so popular that a second was held. It became an annual affair. In a decade it has grown to a three-day festival involving thousands of persons and attracting half a hundred men's and women's foursomes from four states.

The girls will again kickoff the three-day festivities on Thursday evening, February 23, announces Gleemen Chairman Eddie McVay. They will compete for the women's Northwest championship and \$350 in prize money. The first competition held last year was won by the Pina Four of Lebanon. It is not known whether they will return to defend their title.

Male quartets will have the spotlight Friday and Saturday evenings. They will compete for the coveted Northwest ballad crown, trophies, and \$1000. The 1955 champions are the Forceps Four of Portland. This quartet has since broken up.

Author Holbrook Donates Books to Grove Library

Stewart Holbrook, famous writer of Northwest subjects, takes a special interest in the Cottage Grove library. According to Mrs. Dan Hamant, librarian, Mr. Holbrook has donated a total of 250 books to the local library within the last six years. His donation of 22 books recently, brought the total up to the present amount. Mrs. Hamant states that Mr. Holbrook has promised to bring the total up to 500 books eventually.

The library had a circulation of 1,561 books during the month of November. Adult readers borrowed 1,025 books, while there were 536 children's books checked out. The library collected \$44 for fines and rentals.

Besides receiving the 22 new books from Mr. Holbrook, the library has purchased 48 other new books. The following lists a few of the books that are now available.

Non-Fiction Rentals

"No Facilities for Women" is the story of a woman reporter's trip through Europe. "French Bread" is the latest of Dykeman's river series. John Gunther's "Inside Africa" reveals the "inside" story of African people, politics, etc. Stewart Holbrook's "James J. Hill" is an early railroad history. The latest of the airplane stories is Murchie's "Song of the Sky." "Doctor to the Islands" and "Arctic Doctor" are stories of medical men who had to meet unusual struggles in different parts of the world.

Other interesting non-fiction books include Denis' "Leopard in my Lap," Hult's "Untamed Olympics," Arbutnot's "African Hunt," Treffs' "They Never Talk Back," Flesch's "Why Johnny Can't Read," Dale Roger's "My Spiritual Diary," and the biography of "Kaiser" by Von Kurenborg.

"The Tontine" is a new two volume novel by Costain, author of "Black Rose." Kennedy's "Up Home" is a sequel to "Peacable Kingdom." Ures, author of "Battle Cry," has written a new one called "Angry Hills." "Lofts" "Winter" is a novel about the Donner party.

Other good new books on the fiction shelf are Dennis' "Auntie Mame," Dane's "Flower Girls," Shute's "Breaking Wave," Frank's "Intimate Story," and Jennings' "Chronicle of Calypso Clipper."
