At Eugene where the Weather Bureau peak forecast is seven feet with Lookout Point, Cottage Grove and Dorena Reservoirs in operation, a reduction of six feet has been effected in the flood stage. The flood stage would have been approximately 13 feet with the three reservoirs above Eugene, Colonel Graham said.

Still farther downstream at Salem the forecast was 21 feet which will represent a reduction of 4.8 feet effected by Detroit, Fern Ridge, Lookout Point, Cottage Grove and Dorena Reservoirs. Without the storage of water behind the structures a major flood stage of 25.8 would have been reached Wednesday, December 28.
