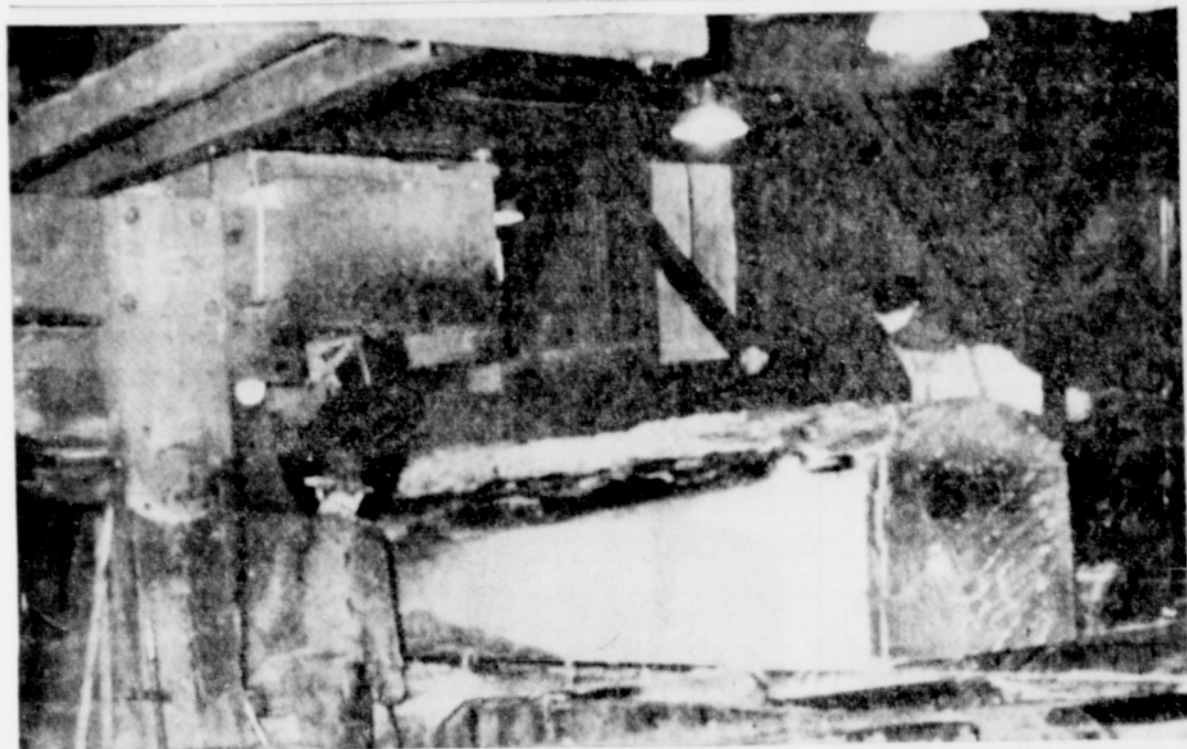

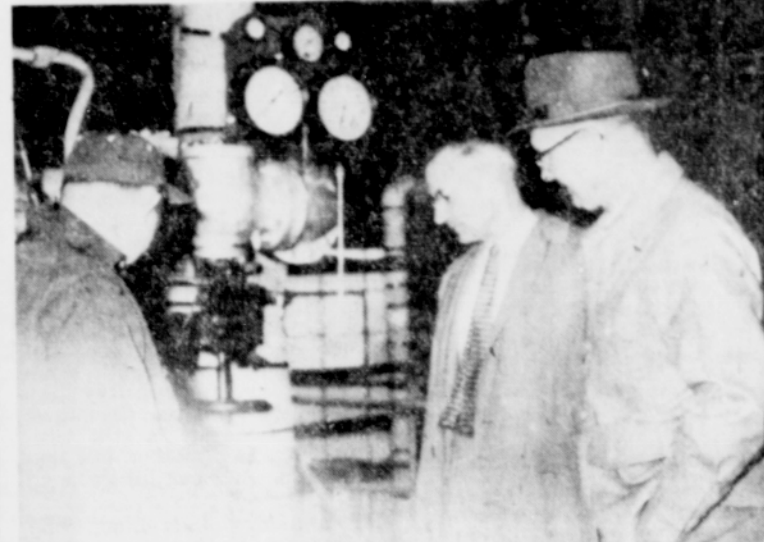

LONDON — The Blackbutte weather station, manned by Mr. and Mrs. Fred Mills, was not only a wet place but a busy place with six weather reports going in Sunday, December 24, for a 24 hour period when 3.73 inches of rain fell. Seven reports went in Thursday with 2.31 inches reported. 2.45 inches fell Wednesday. Last reports for both days were made at 11 p.m. For the 12 days including December 16 through the 27th a total of 14.98 inches was recorded.

No serious flooding occurred or was reported in the community. The river was over the road a few inches in a number of places Wednesday night but did not interfere with traffic.
