Deposits in 1st Nat'l Bank Show Drop Past Year

Deposit increases of more than \$36 million during 1955—a year which saw no mergers or bank purchases by First National—marks the bank's greatest period of growth— from within its entire 90 year history, C. B. Stephenson, president of the statewide branch banking system revealed Thursday.

Year-end statement of condition figures for the Cottage Grove branch of First National show that on December 31, 1955, deposits at the branch were \$9,161,988 and loans were \$3,132,843, according to branch Manager and Vice President H. E. Eakin.

Released at the same time were comparable totals for the branch for December 31, 1954. On that date deposits were \$10,106,619 and loans totalled \$2,012,031.

Fringe Problems To Be Heard Jan. 16th at Eugene

Portland City Commissioner, Ormond R. Bean, chairman of the legislative interim committee on "Local Government and Urban Area Problems," announced today a public hearing on questions of local government and fringe area services will be held in Eugene on Monday, January 16, at 7:30 p.m. at the Eugene School district auditorium, 275 7th Avenue east. This open hearing should be of special interest to many groups and individual citizens living in the Lane County area who are facing individual problems brought about by the rapid expansion of their communities.

This is one of a series of public hearings which will be held in different parts of the State to get directly from citizens more information about specific problems, any data which might aid in analysis and suggestions for possible solutions. An invitation to attend and participate in the Eugene meeting is extended to all interested groups and individuals residing in Lane County. Representatives of small community groups and local public service district organizations such as water, street lighting, fire protection and others are particularly urged to participate. Among specific questions which the Committee hopes to have discussed are:

Sewerage disposal, transportation, parks and recreation. How they can be financed, annexation laws and incorporation laws and procedures, functions of city governments, financing public services, methods of taxation, subdivision controls.

The committee is also asking for suggestions and comments, especially from those unable to attend.

Misko of Oregon City.
