

Ivan C. Hoyer Heads Stamp Society, Gold Cup Exhibition Date March 8

South Lane Stamp Society entered its sixth year of philatelic activity last Thursday evening as the stamp collectors of Cottage Grove and area gathered for the first meeting of 1956 in the clubroom of the city library.

High on the agenda of business was the election of officers for the year. Ivan C. Hoyer was elected to the office of president, succeeding Mrs. Martin Bomar. Advance information indicates the show will be the best ever staged by the Society with many new and unusual entries scheduled.
