LATHAM—A surprise greeted Omar Bishop in his trailer house in the P and M trailer court early Friday morning. As he turned on the gas to get his breakfast an explosion occurred which set his clothing on fire. He was able to get the fire out but was badly burned before he called Charles Mees out of bed. He was taken to Cottage Grove hospital by ambulance where it is expected he will need to remain 10 days or two weeks. He is employed on the State Highway Bridge Construction crew. Mr. Bishop usually returns to his home at Silverton on Friday evenings. He has a wife and two children. Mrs. Bishop came up right away. The trailer house was not burned. Only two spots about the size of a dime were blistered.
