Treasurer Receipts Over \$14,000,000 First Six Months

Total receipts for the first six months of the fiscal year 1955-56 are \$14,331,539.28 according to the six-month report recently released by Olga Freeman, county treasurer. This represents an increase of \$1,169,703.90 over the comparable period a year ago. Increased tax collections of \$441,191.13 account for part of the larger receipts.

During the six-month period Mrs. Freeman reports that she paid out \$7,812,525.75. Of this amount \$76,431.43 was paid to Union High School District No. 14 and \$55,370.29 to School District No. 45. The City of Cottage Grove was paid \$51,260.14.

The county treasurer's semi-annual report of receipts and disbursements covering the period from July 1, 1955, through December 31, 1955, shows that taxes account for \$9,922,205.12 of the total receipts. Other large payments to the treasurer include \$839,510.21 from the sale of bonds by a number of school districts; \$1,315,480.89 from the United States Treasurer on account of O & C lands; \$1,073,278.93 from the Secretary of State as Lane County's share of income from the sale of timber and rentals of forest reserve land; and \$455,371.98 for the use of the road department from motor vehicle and fuel taxes.

Other sources of revenue include fees and fines from district court, circuit court, and constables in the amount of \$67,355.02; clerk's fees, \$44,404.75; health department, \$19,245.63; Willamalane Park, \$21,428.36; Fair Board, \$35,853.31; rentals, \$7,097.26, and interest earned, \$7,076.94.

The state remitted for use of public assistance during the six months \$74,160.40; for the county \$12,600; for the state school fund, \$34,185.68; and for various reimbursements to the general fund, \$4,646.23.

Of court cases were turned over to Mrs. Freeman in the amount of \$11,331.22 and taxes withheld from employees in the amount of \$92,226.01; leaving an amount of \$194,135.32 received from miscellaneous sources.

Of the over nine million dollars in taxes collected during the six months and turned over to the treasurer, \$7,319,048.27 were segregated during the interval. Schools were credited with \$5,771,946.13 of the segregation either as special district tax for operating and sinking fund purposes or through the rural elementary and rural high tax and county school fund. Cities were credited with \$882,236.20; the county, \$409,947.70; water districts, \$87,154.59; park districts, \$64,109.56; fire districts, \$55,115.43; forest fire patrol, \$24,694.80; Western Lane Hospital district, \$11,865.71; Port of Siuslaw, \$10,160.67; the Amazon Water Control district, \$1,558.99; and the Lowell Sanitary District, \$254.57.

Disbursements to school districts, including warrants drawn on the county school fund, the rural elementary and rural high funds, and the state school fund, totaled \$3,611,562.47 for the six months, according to Mrs. Freeman. A total of \$631,868.76 was paid to Lane county cities.
