Cottage Grove Lions Devour North Bend in 84-73 Spree

Cottage Grove rode easily on the top of a high scoring heap to defeat the North Bend Bulldogs 84-73 on the local court Friday night. The Lions, ruled up over the pounding handed them by Marshfield the night before, grabbed an early lead and never fell behind.

Byron Angell, with a short jump shot from the right, opened the game, and was followed by Ron Rice who literally plowed through the Bulldog defense to hook one in from under the basket to give the Lions a 4-0 lead. Bulldog guard Bert Why brought North Bend within one point of Cottage Grove at a score of 12-11, but Castle retaliated with a jump shot from under the basket and a tip in sandwiched around a short shot from left by Leon Hayes, to push the Lions ahead 18-11. Hayes closed the quarter by dumping in a fielder from left with four seconds to play. First quarter score: Cottage Grove 20, North Bend 13.

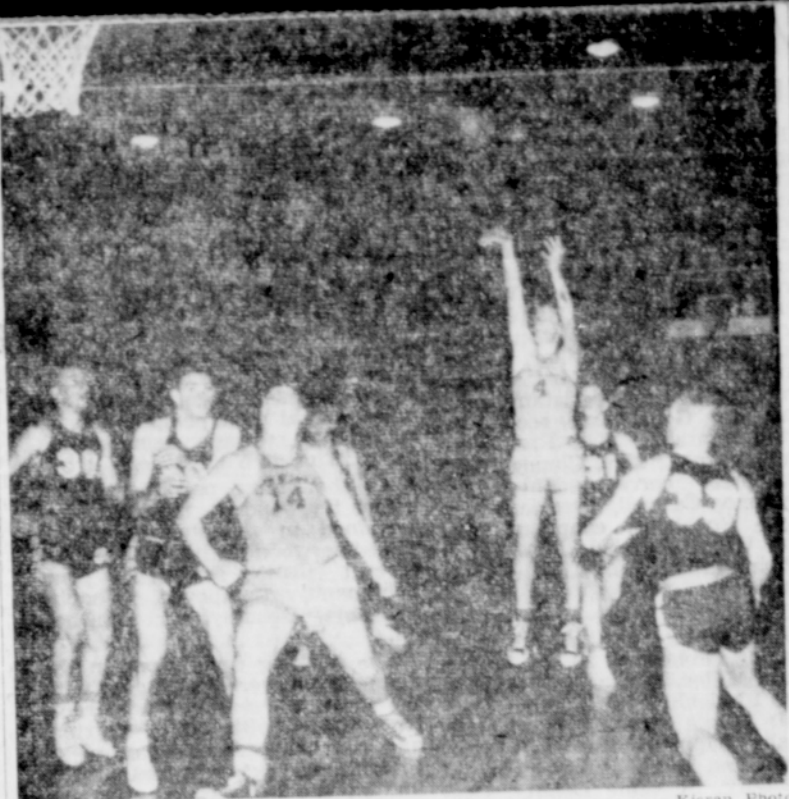
Castle repeated his eight point performance of the first period by scoring the same in the second, pushing Grove to a 44-30 halftime lead. His points were shared equally between free throws and shots from the field during that quarter. Hayes contributed six and Angell pushed in four as effective aids.

Castle tipped in another two pointer at the open of the third period to give him 18 points, but he failed to get another field goal during the game and ended with 19 points. Jim Nichols led the Lion scoring in the third quarter with eight points, while Bob Jacobson piled in 10 for the Bulldogs. Hayes and Rice each scored six as the Lions roared off to a 68-49 lead.

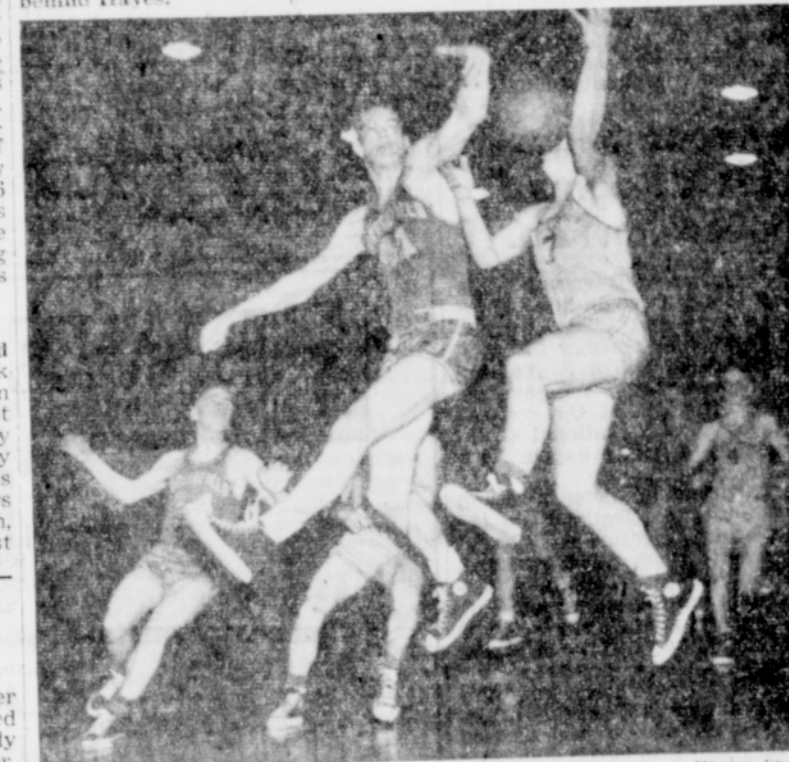
Jack Shanley, who had scored only two points for the North Bend squad for three periods, began hitting the hoop in the final period to the tune of 11 points. Rice dropped in three fielders and a free throw, however, to boost the Lions on to a 84-73 victory.

Rice was the big scorer of the game with 21 points and Castle took second honors with 19. Hayes dropped in 18 for the Lions, while Bert Why did the same for the Bulldogs. Five men on the Grove squad scored in the double figures for a combined tally of 80 points. The local boys hit 35 of 73 attempts from the field for a .487 average. The Bulldogs could only get 22 successful tries out of 76 for a 28.9 percentage. The Lions controlled the backboard at the rate of almost two to one, taking off 66 rebounds to North Bend's 37.
