**Eugene Art Center
Has Rental Service**

An art rental service, the first of its kind to be held in Lane county, is currently being sponsored in Eugene by Eugene Art Center. A representative group of 26 paintings has been chosen for the rental collection from works submitted by amateur and professional artists in the Eugene-Springfield area.

It is hoped that the rental service will stimulate interest in the work of local artists by placing paintings in homes, offices and public buildings. This new service gives everyone the opportunity to experience the pleasure of having an original painting in office or home without the obligation to buy.

The rental fee is based on a

percentage of the purchase price. Paintings selling for under \$15 will rent for 30 cents per month; those from \$15 to \$25 for 75 cents per month, etc. Rental fees will apply on the purchase price if desired. The rental period is three months. The Eugene Art Center plans to continue the service with a new selection of paintings about every four months, and it is hoped that more works will be submitted from all over Lane county as the plan progresses.

The rental collection was on display at the Very Little Theater in Eugene from February 7 to 11, at the Bon Marche in Eugene from February 13 to 18, and at the Art Center building at Pioneer Park February 20 and 21.

Everyone is invited to view these paintings and to take advantage of this opportunity to rent or own the original work of an artist of this locale.

**Training Meet Set
For 4-H Leaders**

A training meeting on clothing projects for 4-H leaders is planned for Thursday, February 23, in the Conference room at the Lane County Extension office, 1170 Pearl street, Eugene.

Beginning at 10:30 a.m., the leaders will study necklines and collars. Miss Hattie Mae Ribbons, extension agent in 4-H work, will demonstrate the technique of setting in sleeves. From 1 to 3 p.m., the leaders will make samples of items suitable for blouses, aprons, and skirts. Each leader has been asked to take a portable sewing machine, if possible, and a half yard of print material. Those attending the all-day session are asked to take a sack luncheon. **National Guard Recruit
Day to Be Held Feb. 19**

Major General Thomas E. Riley, State Adjutant General, announced recently that all National Guard units in Oregon will conduct a one-day recruiting drive February 19. "The purpose of the campaign," he said, "is to help enlist 75,000 new volunteers. Guardsmen urgently needed to meet the Fiscal Year goal set by Congress for the United States, Puerto Rico, Alaska and Hawaii. "We hope through a brief but intensive drive to stimulate a broadly-based community interest in meeting the need for a larger National Guard through

the democratic means of voluntary enlistment."

"Present strength of the National Guard in the United States and territories is at an all-time high but it still falls short of what the military planners in Washington have in mind for us," General Riley said that present strength of the Army National Guard in Oregon on January 20 was 5,922 and that the net increase needed to meet the state's quota for this year was 1,200. "As a result," he said, "we are setting this figure as a statewide goal in the one-day campaign."

The basic program of the one-day campaign will consist of a two-hour drill period the morning of February 19, following which all Guard members will engage in various recruiting activities. There will be open houses at armories, parades, displays and aerial flyovers by National Guard planes, depending upon the size of the units and the facilities available to them.

**'Egg Most Complete Food Package
Ever Designed,' Says County Agent**

Culinary magic lies within the egg. And, according to Miss Virginia Moorman, Lane county extension agent in home economics, it's an art Lane county homemakers should use to the fullest. Especially in February when egg prices are low.

"Eggs are one of Lane County's most plentiful products," said Miss Moorman. "Poultrymen holding their five-weeks short course in Eugene say that close to four million dozens of eggs were produced by Lane county hens last year."

Indispensable to the gourmet, the egg is also a favorite with the dietitian.

"It's the most complete food package ever designed," said Miss Moorman. "The egg is a combination of proteins, essential fats, minerals, and vitamins—all needed for growth and body maintenance."

Miss Moorman underscores the versatility of eggs in the following recipes. She suggests Baked Eggs for luncheon — Souffléed Cheese Sandwiches as a perfect

after-the-theater treat — and Swedish cookies as a delectable dessert.

Zesty Baked Eggs

1/3 cup salad dressing or mayonnaise
1/8 tsp. pepper
1/4 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. paprika
1/2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
1/2 cup milk
1 cup grated sharp cheese

8 eggs
Combine salad dressing and seasoning. Gradually add milk stirring after each addition until smooth. Add cheese and cook over LOW heat until cheese is melted, about 5 minutes.
Spoon the sauce into each of 8 individual greased baking dishes. Break 2 eggs into each dish and top with remaining sauce. Place in pan of hot water. Bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) until eggs are desired consistency, 12 to 15 minutes. 4 servings.

Souffléed Cheese Sandwich

6 slices bread
Sliced cheese to cover bread
1/4 tsp. salt
3 eggs, separated
1/4 cup salad dressing
Toast bread on one side. Cover untoasted side with cheese. Add salt to egg whites and beat until shiny and whites leave peaks when beater is withdrawn. Add salad dressing to yolks and beat until light. Fold yolk mixture into whites. Heap on top of cheese. Bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) until puffy and brown, about 15 minutes. Serve promptly. 6 sandwiches.

Swedish Cookies

1/2 cup shortening
1/2 cup confectioners' sugar
1/8 tsp. almond extract
3 egg yolks, hard cooked
1 cup sifted all-purpose flour
1/4 tsp. salt
Red jelly
Cream shortening, sugar, flavoring, and yolks, sieve. Work in flour and salt. Chill Roll 1/8 inch thick. Cut half the dough with cookie cutter; the other half, with doughnut cutter of same size. Place doughnut-shaped cookie portion atop round portions. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) until delicately browned, about 20 minutes. Cool. Just before serving fill center with jelly. About 18 two-inch cookies.

Listed to the Department as disaster areas by the Oregon state disaster committee are: Coos, Curry, Douglas, Jackson and Josephine counties.

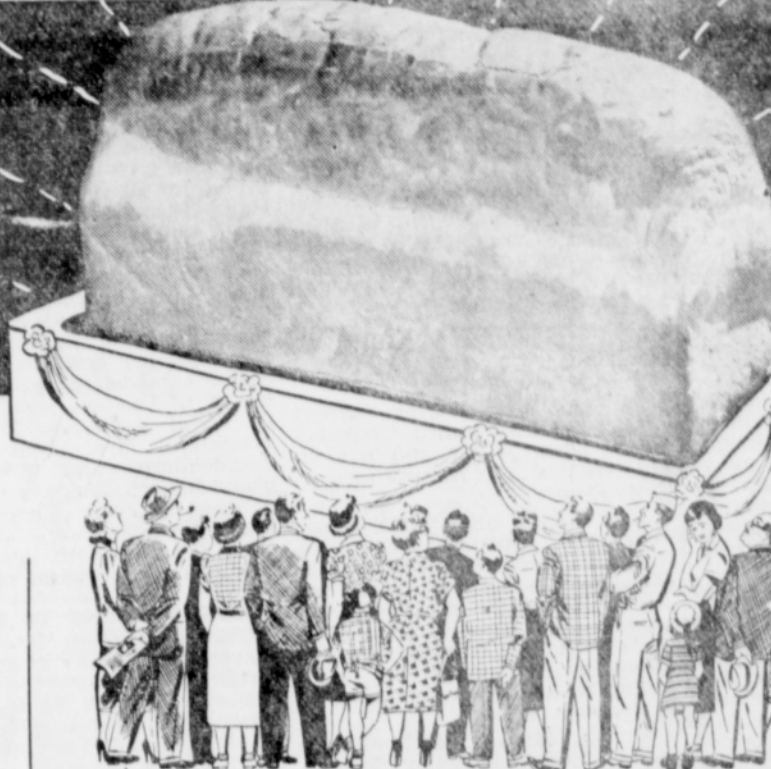
Applications for supplies of feed grain may be made now to Farm Home Administration offices in the several counties. Congressman Ellsworth was told.

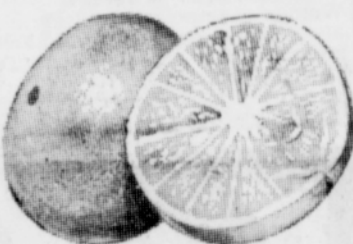
