11th Rural Health Conference Opens Mar. 8 in Portland

Eleventh National Conference on Rural Health will be held at Multnomah hotel, Portland, March 8 to 10. The conference is sponsored by the American Medical Association, Oregon Medical Society and the Oregon Rural Health Council and its member agencies. Fred L. Morris, administrator of Cottage Grove hospital, and Mrs. Mary Arne, Dorena Grange, are the representatives doing the publicity in South Lane county.

As in the past, an informal pre-conference session for members of the medical profession will be held Thursday morning, March 8, beginning at 9 a.m. This has become known as the "Doctor's Session."

The main topic will be "The Doctor's Responsibility in the Physician - Patient Relationship," and sub-topics will include "Responsibility in the Over-all Health of the Community"; "Getting the Patient's Cooperation in Rendering Medical Care"; "Advising the Family About Physical Examinations"; and "Community Health Survey and Its Part in the Family Relationship." A discussion period will follow.

"Your Doctor and You" has been chosen as the theme for the general sessions starting Thursday afternoon. Such subjects as the family and its physician, various phases of mental health, problems of the aged, and the uses and abuses of health insurance will be discussed. Panel and resource persons will be available for questions and ample time will be devoted to discussion and audience participation.

One of the important presentations will be "The Family and Their Physician" and panel members taking part will include a mother, father, 4-H boy, 4-H girl, a physician.

Lane Easter Seal Campaign Starts

Lane County chairman of the 1956 Easter Seal campaign is Mrs. Edgar Goodnough of Eugene. The appointment was announced Wednesday by James Torson, executive director of the Oregon Society for Crippled Children and Adults.

Mrs. Goodnough said that the annual county appeal will be conducted in cooperation with state and national campaigns beginning March 10 and continuing through April 10.

Money from the drive is used for activities benefiting crippled children. Most of the income from the Lane County campaign will be earmarked for the Children's Hospital School in Eugene. Over 90 percent of the fund collected in Oregon will remain in the state for direct service, the remainder supporting a nationwide program of education and direct services and a research program conducted by the Easter Seal Research Foundation.

Volunteer workers will begin mailing Easter Seals March 10 to 50,000 residents of Lane County. The 1956 Seal displays a white lily next to a child on crutches, on a blue background. The words, "Help Crippled Children," are printed in red along the bottom of the stamp. Along the top are the words in white — "Easter Seals."

The sale of Easter Seals is the society's principal source of revenue and the funds are used to finance, in addition to the Children's Hospital School in Eugene, Camp Easter Seal near Reedsport, the state's only summer camp for crippled children, and the Craft Shop of the Handicapped in Portland, a retail outlet for articles made by the physically handicapped. Easter Seal funds also help the Oregon Society for Crippled Children and Adults to maintain an equipment pool of wheelchairs, walkers and related equipment for loan to crippled persons.

Local Teachers To Set Policies At Portland Meeting

Whether the organization will support a state sales tax will be a major consideration of 160 delegates to the representative council of the Oregon Education Association who will meet in the Lincoln high school auditorium in Portland on March 2 and 3. The purpose of the annual session is to determine the policies of organization for the coming year, which will affect current issues of key importance to Oregon's school program. OEA President Mrs. Antonia Crater of Newberg will preside at the session.

The council is the governing body for the organization, a statewide professional association for educators, which counts in its ranks some 12,600 or 85% of all Oregon teachers. Local teachers will serve as delegates.

Mrs. Cora Dailey will represent Cottage Grove at the Portland meeting.

Mr. Hastings had been in the lumber business before retiring to his farm on Mosby Creek, where he and Mrs. Hastings had lived many years before moving to Eugene and then to their farm on Route 1, Creswell.

Surviving are three daughters: Mrs. Roy Jensen and Mrs. Frank Essley, both of Portland, and Mrs. Jess Coppers, Meacham; four grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p.m., Saturday, March 3, at Mills Mortuary, with Mr. Sherwood Smith officiating. Vault interment will be in the local IOOF cemetery.

Seasonings to Choose

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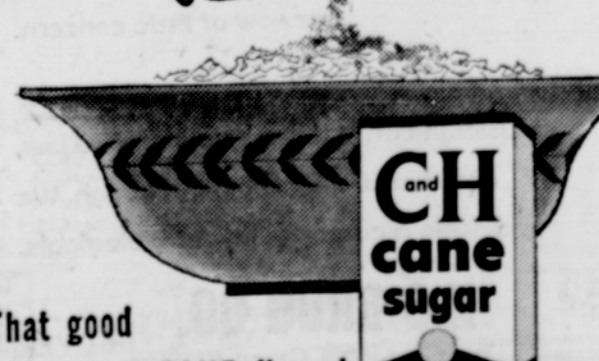
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
