A major portion of all proceeds from the drive will be used locally in this state to combat the heart diseases through research, education and community heart programs. The remainder will go to advance the national program of the American Heart association, with at least one-half being used for its extensive research program.

collection promises to be both colorful and informative.

Clifford Shields of Eugene has entered two frames of what is termed "Topical" collecting, in showing the U. S. Flag in color on foreign postage stamps. His collection is virtually complete. Cyrus Prouty of Eugene has entered two frames of Great Authors on postage stamps, both late and contemporary and showing foreign as well as United States postal issues.

Lance Naish will exhibit his unusual collection of oddities on U. S. stamps. Among the many items to be displayed in his frames are: Misspelled name on postmark, a cover that went through a Los Angeles mail fire, stamps smeared in printing and inverted plate numbers. Mr. Naish stated that other unusual items, not commonly issued, and almost never seen by the public are albino envelopes, stamps with the perforation cut into the stamp itself, rare plate number coils, coil stamps are cut with such a small margin that plate numbers are normally cut off, envelopes without stamps, unguessed stamps, and a very unusual envelope with an embossed postmark stamped printed on the inside of the envelope.

South Lane Stamp society's fifth annual show will contain many other interesting and outstanding stamp collections. Most of them can be made up by anyone over a period of time, but are rare and beautiful. The Sunday afternoon show will be open to the public free of charge from 2 to 5 p.m.

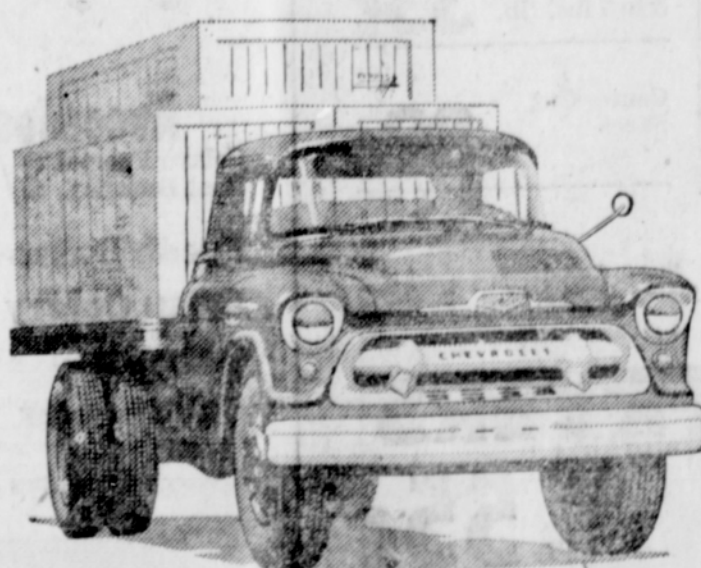

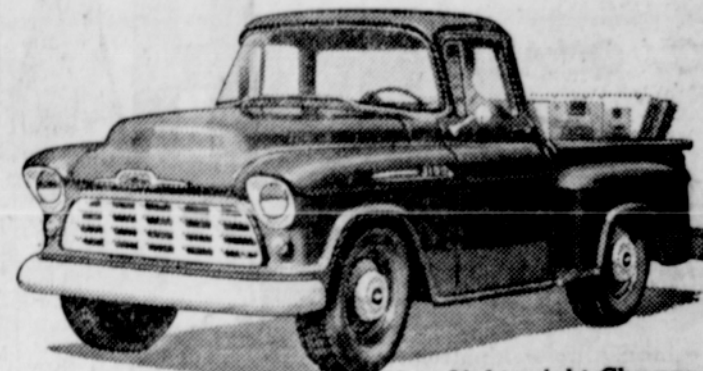
