Lane County Women Learn Mending Techniques in Home Extension Units

The old adage about a "stitch in time" has popular appeal for more than 1200 women who will learn new techniques for an old art—mending—during their home extension unit meetings in March. "Mending Tips" ranked fifth among the top seven projects selected by unit members from a list of 24 suggested topics.

It is termed "one of the most worthwhile projects of the year" by Miss Virginia Moorman, Lane extension agent in home economics, who presented the training session to project leaders in early February in the Conference room at the Lane County extension service office, 1170 Pearl street, Eugene.

Project leaders will share their

new found "know-how" at unit meetings open to all interested women in Lane county. Locations and dates of these meetings are available from the extension office or by calling 5-8418.

A Rosy Aura
Simplified procedures for mending—such as the use of an embroidery hoop, scraps, "tail ends" of thread, and other mending helps.

Mending as a project lesson is offered in Lane county for the first time since 1950. During this interim many procedures have become streamlined.

Quick Overall Patch
A favorite patch which is new to many women is the quick overall patch, commented Miss Moorman. "It's done entirely on machine and is equally adaptable for knee, elbow or seat. With this procedure it's not necessary to rip open seams in order to work on a flat surface. This quick patch is easy to sew into the leg of even a pair of size-two blue jeans."

Project leaders were also interested in the techniques for invisible mending—or the "woven-in" patch.

"This is the most tedious type of mending," said Miss Moorman, "but it's time well spent if it means the salvage of a new garment or upholstery. The patch is woven into the material through the use of a crochet hook. A magnifying glass eases eyestrain."

Other types of mending which project leaders will pass on to unit members will include the repair of knitted fabrics, the various uses of press-on mending tapes, twill tape reinforcements for pockets and buttons, and the net mend.

Mending-aids which are available from the Lane county extension office include "Carpet Rug Repair," "ABC's of Mending," "Quick Overall Patch," and "Mending Men's Suits."
