Veterans Still May Apply for Home Loan Insurance

The Department of Veterans' Affairs has started mailing insurance certificates to 7400 state veterans' home and farm loan borrowers who have applied for coverage under the department's new mortgage cancellation life insurance program.

The insurance, designed to pay off the mortgage of a state veteran loan borrower in event of his death, becomes effective March 1.

Current borrowers who haven't applied for the insurance have until May 31 to do so, without proving insurability, according to H. C. Saalfeld, director of the state veterans' department. Veterans whose loans are closed after March 1 will be automatically covered by the insurance unless they write the director and turn it down.

About 80 percent of the existing eligible borrowers have applied for the insurance, Saalfeld said. The insurance, authorized by the 1955 legislature and provided by Standard Insurance company, Portland, costs the veteran 28 cents a month per \$1,000 of insurance on the unpaid balance of his mortgage. The insurance cost does not increase the veteran's monthly repayments. It is paid by adding a few more months to the end of his repayment period.

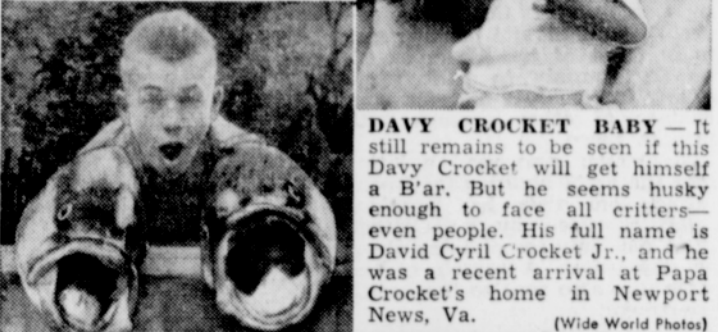

Big and Small Babies

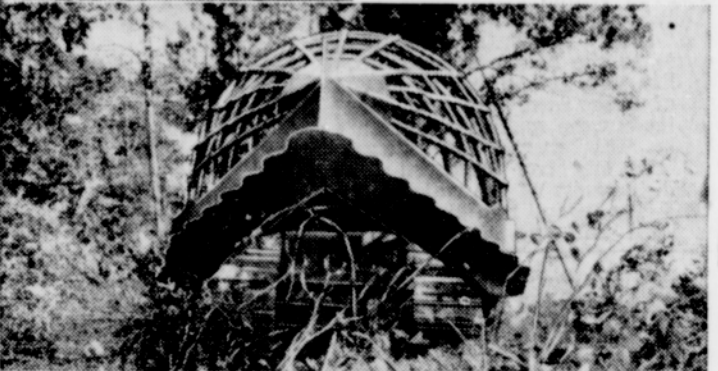

The annual UN pilgrimage and the contest to select the high school students for the trip are sponsored by the Odd Fellows and Rebekah lodges. In the event that the first place winner is unable to make the trip, Miss Chapman will go in his place.

Other contestants not placing were Miss Jacqueline Higgins, Oakridge, who submitted an essay in the essay contest but was unable to attend the speech contest; Miss Erlene Van Devender, Elmira High school; Miss Doris Pilaczynski, Springfield High school, and Vicky Joy Cheshire, Junction City High school.

The expense-free trip will start early in July when winners from Oregon, Washington and British Columbia will leave Spokane, Wash., by Greyhound bus. They will travel through Canada and northern United States into New York, where they will spend a week at the United Nations and seeing New York. They will go to Washington, D. Judges were Charles Duncan, dean of journalism at University of Oregon; Glen Starlin, director of speech at the university and Thurston Dolor, department of speech at Oregon State college.

the appointment of a working chief. There are many complications which could arise in connection with fire insurance rates in the city and the committee said it felt it was not qualified to go further into the matter and suggested that a qualified person be appointed to look into the matter.

In the city water department, the committee said it was impossible to make a comparison due to the various ways this department may be set up in the various cities. Progress has been made in the water distribution system, the pay scale in this department is low and should be adjusted upward to some extent.

The report suggested that it would be logical to pick out the best laborers in the water and

street department and make them foremen at a small increase in salary.

The report took note of the street improvements made in the last two or three years, said the property owners should be encouraged to share in the improvement program further; that two blocks from West Main street on N street to the Cottage Grove hospital should be paved and that a street widening program should be undertaken adjacent to the business district similar to that as under the Whiteaker street proposal to provide more parking space.

An additional suggestion made in the report was that the miscellaneous fund of each department be placed in the general fund so that the council would have control of the city expenditure.

A further suggestion was that the council look into the proposition of leasing or renting new equipment when in need of motor vehicles. The committee said from the general information gathered it would appear that a budget of \$80,000 to \$85,000 would meet the needs of the city in addition to outside revenues and receipts, as against a budget of approximately \$109,000 last year.

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DISABLED VETS HUNTING AND FISHING LICENSES

Disabled veterans are not required to appear in person to obtain their hunting and fishing licenses as has been quoted to newspapers by several misinformed persons, the Oregon Game commission said today. However, these licenses are issued only at the game commission's Portland headquarters and cannot be obtained at the various license agencies.

Also, the commission said, by not following the correct procedures as prescribed by law, many veterans have experienced delay in obtaining their licenses. To avoid these inconveniences and to expedite the issuance of licenses, qualified disabled veterans are requested to proceed in the following manner:

1. Obtain a letter from the Veterans Administration showing the current rated disability.
2. Obtain an application for a disabled veterans license from the game commission, fill it out and sign it. The application need not be notarized as was required in the past.
3. Send the application, the disability rating, and your remittance to the Oregon Game Commission, 1634 S. W. Alder, Portland, Oregon. If everything is in order upon receipt, your license will be sent to you without delay.

Application blanks may be obtained at the commission's Portland headquarters or at the regional offices. The regional offices are located at Route 1, Box 325, Corvallis; Box 977, Roseburg; 222 E. Third Street, Bend; Box 742, La Grande; and Box 8, Hines.
