Students Prepare Pakistani Dinner For Hoyer Family

Rifat Kadri of Karachi, Pakistan, and Abdul Tnsari from India were the guests of Mr. and Mrs. Ivan C. Hoyer for the day March 14. Both are foreign students attending University of Oregon. Mr. Kadri securing a master's degree in geography, and Mr. Ansari securing a doctorate in the field of mathematics, preparatory to returning to India and becoming an instructor in the government system of universities.

The two students visited Harrison grade school during the afternoon and were shown the operation of the elementary school system. Later they were shown the office procedures of public accounting firm by V. B. Hoyer in his business office.

The Ivan C. Hoyer family, Bruce Bush family, and Mr. and Mrs. V. B. Hoyer were treated to an original Pakistani dinner at the home of Mr. and Mrs. V. B. Hoyer that evening. The students chose the food items, prepared the dinner and served it.

Menu for the dinner included: Chicken Biryani, a rice and chicken dish; Qima Mutter, a dish of hamburger, peas and onions; Raita, a salad of yogurt, onions and green peppers; Puri, a fried bread (flat and round, the shape of a pancake); Shahi Tukray, a bread dessert fried in a batter of milk and sugar; tea and coffee.

All of the dishes were original in every respect. Many spices, as well as food coloring, were employed in preparation of the meal, which took nearly three hours to prepare.

Following the dinner the students displayed, for the entertainment of all present, various Pakistani and Indian songs and dances and drum techniques.
