Two Speakers Urge Adult Participation In Scout Program

Scouting was the theme for the District 45 Parent-Teacher association meeting Monday evening in the Harrison school multi-purpose room. Brownie Scouts, Cub Scouts and Boy Scouts participated in the very interesting program. Two speakers, Winfield Atkinson, Eugene, and Elmer Maple, Drain, stressed the importance of adult participation in the scout program.

To get the feel of the evening's program, Cub Pack 400 was initiated in the presence of parents, friends and teachers. This was their first meeting and Lance Naish gave the initiation service. Cub Master for Pack 400 is Roy Ulmer, with Robert Cherry as assistant Cub Master. Don Larsen is chairman of their committee, which consists of Buster R. Miller, James E. Representing a sponsoring organization, which is the very beginning of any Cub Pack, Scout, Brownie or Girl Scout Troop, Mrs. Milton Turay was called forward. He further stated that scouting of any type is fun—for the children and fun for the adults who work with them.
