The Cottage Grove Lion baseball squad fell victim to a four-run hitting attack in the seventh inning to lose to Junction City 11-7 at the local high school Monday afternoon. The loss gave the Grove team a one win, two loss, one tie record. They had previously tied Junction City in a 0-0 pitching duel there.

The Lion's split with Springfield, there, last Thursday. Springfield edged out the first five inning game 3-2 and Byron Angell was credited with a 7-2 victory in the second match.

Lion pitcher Leon Hayes had allowed the invading squad only five hits before Don Shumate, Junction City second baseman, smacked a single at the opening of the seventh inning. Don Tuffdahl sacrificed Shumate on to second and Ken Johnson sent him to third with a single. Hayes then walked catcher Pete Drogensen, loading the bases.

Then came the big one. Art Schirmer snuck a long double scampers across the plate and left Drogensen on third. To keep the runners moving, Rod Johnson hit a single, bringing Drogensen in. Schirmer scored the fourth and final run of the inning on a passed ball.

Tuffdahl opened the scoring for

the Junction City squad by slugging a home run in the first inning. The Lions pushed ahead 3-1 in their half of the opening inning when Byron Angell walked. ## Steelhead Run Enters Columbia

A large run of steelhead trout has entered the Columbia river during March, according to Oregon fish commission biologists who are tagging the fish at a research station in Astoria as part of a research investigation. The scientists were pleased to note the great numbers of fish entering the Columbia. All fishermen will be interested. This is a cooperative venture with the Washington department of fisheries and the Oregon game commission.

In a three-day period this month Oregon fish commission biologists tagged 372 steelhead, which is more than the total tagged in 1955. The largest catch for any single day of fishing during the past two years occurred on March 8 of this year, when 143 fish were tagged. During the 14-day period in March, 823 steelhead were captured for tagging by the Oregon fish commission which is slightly less than the number that both Oregon and Washington together tagged last season. Some 2,500 fish have been tagged this winter.

"We are interested in noting the large run of steelhead in the Columbia river this month," says George Y. Harry, Jr., director of research for the Oregon fish commission. "The commercial fishermen think cold temperatures and the unseasonably muddy water of the Columbia may have held back these fish. Our tagging program this winter is proceeding very well and large number of fish have been caught to date."

For which streams are these fish destined? One of the purposes of the tagging program is to gain information on this question. Returns of last year's tags showed the steelhead which were present in the lower Columbia in March chiefly migrated to the following streams: The Willamette river and its tributaries, chiefly the North Santiam and Clackamas; the Sandy and Hood rivers in Oregon; and the Cowlitz system in Washington, including the Toutle river.

Steelhead are identified by two types of tags—a yellow or white plastic cord (known to biologists as a "spaghetti tag") or by red plastic dime-sized discs (known as the Petersen tag). Fish workers

alternate the tags as a check on the merits of each type.

Printed wording on the tags requests the sender to return the marker to the "Oregon Fish Commission, Portland." The biologists request the following information as well as return of the tag: tag number, date, and exact location of capture, as well as the finder's name and address.

The fish commission will return the tags to the finders for souvenirs, if requested. Each person returning a tag also gets a personal letter from the biologists in charge of the study, stating the place and date the fish was originally tagged. Prompt return of a tag with the desired information will greatly aid in the Columbia river steelhead research.
