The Lion baseball squad split a twin bill with Springfield at Kelly Field Friday, losing the first five-inning game 7-0 and winning the second 6-4.

Miller pitcher Don Prociw pitched a 1-hit opener, while his teammates slugged out eight hits to win 7-0. Byron Angell ruined Prociw's chance for a no hitter by slapping a single in the third inning. Angell was the losing pitcher.

It looked as though the Springfield squad was on its way to a clean sweep of the double header when the Miller's opened the second game with five hits and four runs off Lion pitcher Ron Rice. Leon Hayes was called off first base to pitch the rest of the game, shutting out the Millers, while giving up only one hit.

The Lions started their comeback in the bottom of the first inning. Byron Angell singled and was sent to second on a single by Floyd Billings. The bases were loaded after Hayes got on through a pitcher's error. Angell was put out at home as Rice made first through a fielders choice. Sunday Shoot of Club Successful

At the regular meeting of the Cottage Grove Rod and Gun club held at the clubhouse Monday evening, club members discussed the idea of appointing a conservation committee. Purpose of this committee is to keep the members informed on news of conservation of wildlife, legislation along this line and facts pertinent to the development of wildlife.

J. A. Sartelle gave a report on the Oregon Federation of Wildlife meeting held in Portland, the latter part of March.

Ray Vincent reported on the status of the Beaver Marsh dam and the Pelton dam in a relation to conservation. The Beaver Marsh dam is of course a dead issue now and Vincent reported that an injunction against the Portland Electric would be secured should construction work be started. Vincent pointed out no state permit has been secured for the construction of the dam.

Jack Maudling of the Shoot committee reported the club now has about 86,000 clay pigeons and 35 cases of ammunition on hand and that Sunday shoots have been very successful.

W. B. Scott of Creswell was appointed as the club's representative of the Creswell fair board. A motion was approved for the purchase of a PA system and record player.

The club also instructed the secretary to cast an affirmative vote on all five amendments of the Oregon Wildlife federation constitution. At the conclusion of the program, a movie, "Second Battle of the Philippine Sea" was shown.

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Jalopy Association Sets Safety Rules

The Cottage Grove Jalopy association held a business meeting at the Council chambers in the city hall, Wednesday, April 11. A list of rules was presented to the membership for approval, by the Safety committee. The rules were passed with the exception of fire equipment and ambulance service. It was understood that these services would be available at all races.

It was agreed not to allow liquor or intoxicated persons into the pit during races. Other rules passed included:

Keep all race cars stock; cars must be 1947 models or older; all glass and upholstery must be removed; crash helmets and safety belts are mandatory.

A four man technical committee will be appointed to inspect and approve each car before it can be accepted; cars must be equipped with a roll bar; bobbing fenders and nerfing rails are optional; a guard over the radiator and rear of the car is optional.

Persons under 21 must have a waiver from their parents signed by a notary; each race will be a \$100 claim race; pit crews will be limited to three men and they must be members of the association.

All men in the pit crews and drivers must wear whites; any type of wheel and tire may be used as long as the wheel isn't altered and cars must have adequate brakes.
