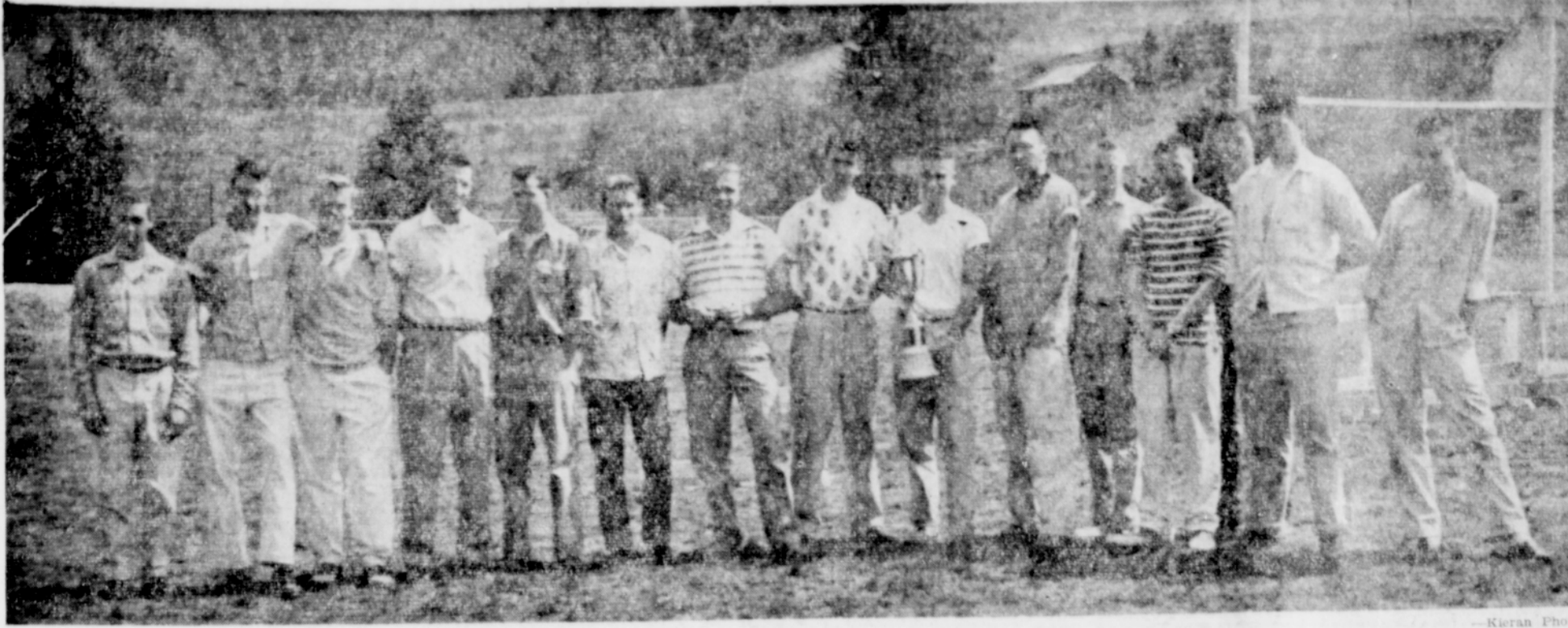

Roseburg Downs Lions 7 to 1

Roseburg received fewer hits than the Cottage Grove Lions in a District 5-A-1 baseball game here Friday, but scored a local-sided 7-1 victory over the local team. The Lions out-hit the Roseburg squad 6 to 5, losing the game on six errors, three passed balls, and a wild pitch.

The only earned runs for the Indians came in the fifth inning, when Al Lindbloom smashed a long triple with two men on base. Lindbloom scored the seventh run for the invading team on a passed ball.

Byron Angell, as the first man up for the Lions, scored the only home team run, by knocking Bill Oeding's first pitch out of the park for a home run. After that Oeding pitched shut out ball.

leaving eight Lions on base. Angell hit a double in the third inning for the only other Lion extra base hit.

Leon Hayes allowed only five hits in the same amount of innings on the mound and gave up only two earned runs out of the seven that were scored. Dean Castle relieved Hayes in the sixth and pitched no hit ball the last two innings.

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Calapooya's Plan Invitational Field Shoot May 6

The Calapooya Archers have planned an invitational field shoot, which will be held at the Archers' new field course, located four miles north of Cottage Grove, and a mile west of Saginaw on the Gil Gardner property, May 6.

The shoot will consist of 14 targets, which must be shot at twice by each competing archer, making a total of 28 target shots. Each target is worth a total of 20 points, on the registered course.

Medals will be given the first three places in each of the distinctive freestyle divisions of men, women, junior, and peewee classes. The shoot will be conducted under the rules of the Oregon Bowhunters and the National Field Archery Association and will be a registered shoot.

Hayes has six hits for 12 times at bat, while Rice has received five hits for 10 times up.

Byron Angell made the biggest improvement in the past week, hitting two for four in the Roseburg game to raise his average from .286 to .363. His two hits in that game were a double and a home run; the only ones hit by the Lions so far.

Floyd Billings has credit for the only triple and is batting third on the list with three for seven—a .429 average. Hayes and Ernie Rollison still lead the RBI column with three each, followed by Rice and Angell with two.

Hayes has scored four runs to lead that column also. Angell has crossed the plate three times himself and Rice, Billings and Gary Johnson are each credited with two runs.

Johnson holds the same lead as last week in stolen bases, with four. Hayes and Rice each have three. Johnson has also received three walks, to lead that column. Rollison has been given two free trips.

On the debit side of the ledger, Johnson has committed the most errors, with four. Only four men have been responsible for errors in league play, the other three being Angell, Hayes and Jim Hoover, with two each.

The strikeout kings are Angell, Johnson and Tom Wicks, each with three. Four other Lions have two strikeouts apiece.

DeWayne Toliver won the broad jump and the 75-yard dash.

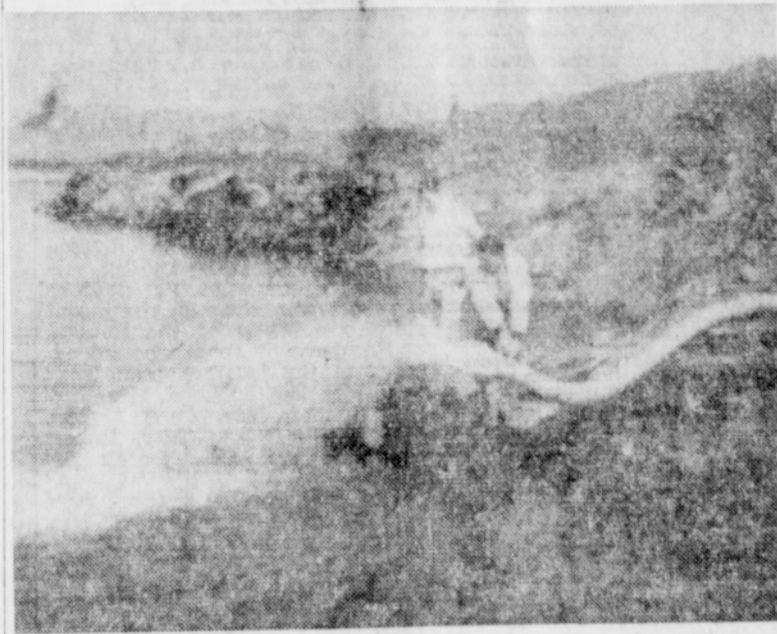
Dyrrol Burleson Paces Lions to 76-46 Track Victory Over Roseburg Team

24,000 Trout Stocked in Area

Approximately 20,000 trout were stocked in and above Dorena reservoir and 4,000 into Cottage Grove reservoir during April for the convenience of local and transient anglers. The fish were brought to the reservoirs by truck from the Leaburg Trout Hatchery on the McKenzie river. The year old trout averaged eight inches in length, varying from six to 10 inches.

Orrin Perry of the Leaburg Hatchery stopped by the Sentinel office Thursday, April 26, and took a Sentinel reporter along on one of his trips to Dorena reservoir. Perry had a load of 900 pounds of fish in his truck. There were approximately 5.5 trout to each pound. With each pound of fish, there was a gallon of water.

The truck was especially equipped with machinery to keep the water circulating and to keep air in it. Ice was used to keep the water cool.
