Power Officials Explain BWB Day

Pacific Power and Light Co. officials had as their guests Monday evening at a dinner served in the dining room of the Cottage Grove golf club, Cottage Grove and Creswell appliance dealers, a representative of the press and radio to kick off BWB Day, which started May 1 and explain its purpose. (BWB means break the bottleneck). It was explained that four out of five homes serving today's families were built during the 1930's or prior when so many electrical appliances were not needed. Today 80 percent of the homes in this area are inadequately wired, which means that the average house may be a fire trap due to the way some houses are wired.

Lee Phillips of the Portland office explained that the purpose of BWB day was to enable the average family to live better electrically. Referring to the average housewife as Bertha Brown, the speaker said Bertha appreciated more appliances because they lightened her housework. She appreciated the extra convenience of outlets for appliances. She was for all the light the family needed and felt that modern wiring was a safety feature for all members of the family.

On the other hand, Bertha (the average housewife) hates electrical blackouts, dimming or blinking of lights when too much of a load is placed on the wiring, slow, sluggish appliances and shrunken TV pictures and octopus outlets, where two or three appliances are hooked into the same outlet.

During the months of May, June and July, the company will inaugurate a campaign to 1 - improve the house wiring 2 - install needed electrical heaters and 3 - install permanent light fixtures. The general purpose is to overcome inadequate wiring, to encourage the use of more electric water heaters, to encourage permanent lighting fixtures for better lights, to sell more appliances, to combat inroads of competitive fuels and better relations with all customers. It is estimated that out of 5,000 homes in this area, a total of 4,000 need rewiring.

Under the BWB plan rewiring can be done on a plan where the average customer will have 36 months to pay for the rewiring.

17th Annual Homemakers Day Ready For Approval of Lane County Women

With final rehearsals scheduled for skits and entertainment and only the finishing touches to be added to exhibits, hundreds of Lane County homemakers are ready to roll up the curtain on their 17th annual production of "Homemakers' Festival." The public is invited to the daylong program in the auditorium building at Pioneer Park, Eugene, May 4, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. There will be no admission charge.

Describing the festival as a "day of fun and frolic" climaxing the year's program for the county's 34 extension units, Mrs. Nancy (William E.) Riley and Miss Virginia Moorman point out that the festival will also "top the celebration of National Home Demonstration week, April 29 through May 5." There is "Today's home builds tomorrow's world."

"Fun and frolic" best characterize the "Home Festival" program which will include exhibits ranging from braided rugs and leather sewing to woven baskets and decorated cakes from 34 extension units, square dancing, slides of South America, a style review, and skits prepared especially for this event. The seven members of the Lane county advisory committee who coordinated plans and arrangements for the festival are: Mrs. Carl Rutherford, Eugene, chairman; Mrs. Willis Blek, Veneta; Mrs. Archie D. Hill, Cottage Grove; Mrs. Carl Smith Jr., Jasper; Mrs. Soren Madsen, Junction City; Mrs. Clarence A. Welty, Florence; and Mrs. Eugene Phillips, Blue River.

Speakers, Skits, Slides
Speakers on the program will be Miss Betty Jane Sedgwick, state extension agent who joined the Oregon staff last October, and Mrs. Azalea (Charles) Sager, state leader who retired in 1952 and in whose honor Azalea House

on Oregon State college campus was named.

Miss Sedgwick, who has had 16 years experience in extension work in South Dakota and Minnesota prior to coming West, will present a flannelgraph story, "This Is Extension."

Mr. and Mrs. Sager will show color pictures and tell of their recent travels in South America. Costumed in South American attire, the Hitchhikers, members of a 4-H club in Frances Willard school, Eugene, will present a series of three gay native dances. The South American influence in this year's festival is all a part of emphasis extension unit members give each year to the "foreign country of their choice" in their study program.

With an original skit, "Let's Have a Clinic," produced by members of the Eugene extension unit, Mrs. Dan Sellard promises slapstick comedy. The clinic and its aims will remain a secret.

Mrs. Robert Gerlach, Junction City unit, will sing comedy solos, and Mrs. V. C. Kelsa, Elmira unit, accompanied by Mrs. L. K. Lewis, Central unit, will lead community singing. Miss Hattie Mae Rhemus, Lane agent in 4-H club work, will lead recreational games.

On the more serious side, Agents Moorman and Riley and members of the Lane advisory committee will conduct a model unit meeting and installation.

Everybody attending the festival is asked to take a sack lunch. Tables will be set up for eating, and coffee and milk will be served.
