Cottage Grove Lions Win Lane County Class A Track Meet

Last Friday the C.G. Thineclads won the Lane County Class A Track Meet at Springfield. The final tally was Cottage Grove 62½, Eugene 46 3/4, Springfield 3/4. Most of the Cottage Grove track men who placed will compete in the District Class A Meet next Friday to be held in Springfield also.

During the course of the evening Cottage Grove took blue ribbons in six events and Dean Castle established a new record in the shot. The old record was 49' 10½", the new record is 52 feet. Dyrrol Burleson placed first in two events for the Lions, in the mile with a time of 4:41.6 and in the 880 yd. dash, time 2:09.5. Other blue men for the Lions were Joe McClarnan (high hurdles, 16.0); Dean Castle (shot 52 feet); Byron Angell (pole vault 11 feet); and Don Martin took the discus with a toss of 150' 4½". More records would doubtless have been broken if the weather had not been so bad. It rained during most of the meet and the track was very firm.

The first four men in the hurdles, 100 and 200 yard dashes will go to the district meet. The top six men will go in all other events. Scoring for the Lions was as follows with placing in parentheses:

Summer Baseball

With the summer vacation for the schools less than a month away, the thoughts of some persons turn toward summer recreation for both the kids and the adults. This is not an unusual process for two organizations in Cottage Grove—American Legion Calvin Funk Post 32 and the South Lane Recreation, Inc.

Each year these organizations sponsor baseball teams, among other events. This column will be devoted to the baseball teams, with information supplied by Floyd Githens, baseball funds chairman of Calvin Funk Post 32.

American Legion Sponsors

This year the American Legion will sponsor Junior Legion and Cottage Grove Town baseball teams, made possible by donations of public spirited citizens of the community. The Sentinel will publish the names of the donors as soon as the list is complete. Those desiring to give, may make checks payable to Calvin Funk Post, American Legion, and mail them to Floyd Githens. These funds will be used specifically for the American Legion sponsored teams.

South Lane Recreation

Last year South Lane Recreation sponsored three teams for boys between the ages of eight and 15. The youngest group, between eight and 11, turned out around 70 strong and had a successful four win, one loss season in competition with Yoncalla, Drain and Elkton boys of the same age group.

The 12 to 13 year old team had a turnout of between 20 to 30 boys. They compiled an 8-3 record in the tough Eugene Athletic League, against boys of the same age.

Around 35 boys turned out for the 14 and 15 year old team, winning 10 games to eight losses in Eugene Athletic League competition with boys of that age.

Tough Season

The Junior Legion team had a tough season, losing all nine of its games by one or two points, competing with other Junior Legion teams in this district. Between 10 and 20 boys turned out for this team.

The Cottage Grove Town team claimed second place in the Evergreen League last year, compiling a 7-3 record. Around 20 men participated on the team. This year, the town team will compete in the Cascade League against such teams as Eugene, Springfield, Junction City, Coburg and Leaburg. The only limitation on age for participation on this team is to be boys Junior Legion age, which is 16 (any boy who becomes 17 before September 1 of this year is ineligible for Junior Legion ball).

Sportsmanship Training

Floyd Githens, speaking for Calvin Funk Post, remarked "It is interesting to note that as a result of our baseball program, many boys are receiving fine training in sportsmanship. In most cases the boys are very serious and show keen interest in their team activities. We also note that the follow through trend is bringing the majority of our Junior Legion and Town team players up through the ranks of the younger teams and resulting in fine players and sportsmen."

Githens also complimented the Town team for the fine showing during the 1955 season, and continued "We take this opportunity to show our appreciation to the many local people and especially Buzz Wyant, who has devoted time and money to this worthy cause. Buzz and Mrs. Wyant have devoted many hours to build up and coach the Cottage Grove Town team. A great deal of credit is due to these folks for untiring effort. The boys who have worked hard for the good of their team and the baseball program deserve a lot of credit for their fine cooperation."

Lack of Public Interest

The one thing that disturbed Githens about the baseball program was the lack of interest shown by the public. He said "Each year as we prepare for the coming baseball program and review the results of the past season, we cannot help but feel disappointed when we note the lack of interest on the part of would be supporters, such as parents, relatives and local people who like the idea of the program but fail to find time to come out to the games and give the boys the moral support they so rightfully deserve. Won't you please give this point serious consideration during the 1956 program," Githens urged. "You will enjoy every minute you spend at any of these games and help the boys a great deal."

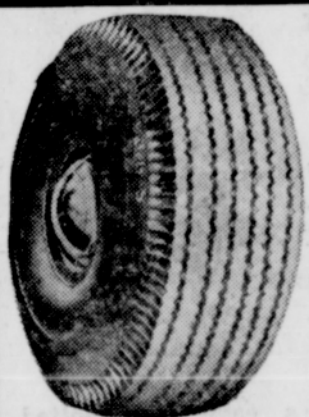
