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Standard Oil Co. Sponsors Highway Cleanup Campaign

Elementary and secondary students in classrooms of Western Oregon will be looking at a colorful "Keep Our Roadside Clean" poster after the last week of April.

Distribution of 200,000 such free posters in the seven western states, Hawaii and Alaska is nearing completion as part of Standard Oil Company of California's 1956 Highway Cleanup campaign.

The company is also promoting roadside cleanliness by sending out more than one million inserts to credit card customers, commercial accounts and all persons requesting travel information.

E. V. Burns, Standard's Portland regional manager, sent the posters to the principals of the individual schools with a letter outlining the need for awakening a sense of individual responsibility in every person who uses roads and highways.

Scholarships Given To Ashland Event

Fifteen acting scholarships for the company of the coming Oregon Shakespearean Festival have been awarded by directors of the annual theatrical event.

Recipients of the scholarships include students, teachers, and professional actors, and chosen from almost 250 actors and actresses applying this year, according to Angus L. Bowmer, festival founder and producing director.

The festival's technical, music, and publicity scholarships have not yet been awarded. The final company will number over 60. Applications for positions were received from 42 states and 3 foreign countries.

Festival directors are B. Iden Payne, guest professor of drama at the University of Texas; Allen Fletcher, veteran festival director of several years; and Harold Todd, of the Idaho State University faculty. Also returning to the staff this year is Richard Hay, who will act as technical director. Hay has done technical work in the theatre during several past seasons.

The festival begins August 1 and runs through September 1. Auditions will be held June 18 and 19, and rehearsals begin June 20.

Let Youngsters Use the Family Sewing Machine

New emphasis on letting the youngster (especially the 4-H club youngster) use the family sewing machine is the key of the all-new training program for 4-H clothing leaders which Miss Hattie Mae Rhonemus, Lane Extension agent in 4-H club work, recently introduced to sewing leaders in the Florence area.

"The new approach is that youngsters can learn to sew with a machine more easily and quickly than with a needle," said Miss Rhonemus. "And mothers needn't be anxious. Sewing machines thrive on use."

Oregon is one of the first states to approve the new training program. "Getting the Most Out of Your Sewing Machine," and 4-H leaders in Florence were among the earliest in the state to receive the special series.

"Our two Lane agents in Home Economics also participated in the state training session and are making the techniques a part of all lessons on the use of the sewing machine," Miss Rhonemus added.

Cooperative Program

Details of the program, explained Miss Rhonemus, were worked out by a nationally known sewing machine company in cooperation with the Cooperative Extension Service and the National

Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work.

"The teaching materials were prepared cooperatively and had the final approval of the State Extension staff," Miss Rhonemus said. "Subject matter is geared to cover the use, adjustment, and use of all types of sewing machines."

Six leaders along the coast who completed the training program are Mrs. Elmer Buss, Mrs. Jeff Speers, Mrs. Herb Houghton, Mrs. Leslie Akerley, Mrs. Dorr Pitney, and Mrs. Vern Meadows.

"Two of the leaders - Mrs. Houghton and Mrs. Akerley - have 4-H members who are beginning to use the sewing machine in their project," Miss Rhonemus said. "The leaders of needle sewers were interested in the course so they would be prepared for the next project."

Leaders reviewed fundamentals such as threading the machine, winding the bobbin, and stitching neatly. But these experienced seamstresses were most fascinated with comparative stitching with

silk, mercerized, and synthetic thread on fabric samples of sheer nylon, wool jersey, wool fleece, acetate pongee, nylon-cotton taffeta, and decorative fabrics. Tensions, pressures, and length of stitch were readjusted as seamstresses re-discovered the "flexibility" of their machines.

"I've never had so much fun," exclaimed Mrs. Akerley. "Always before, I've been afraid to touch the machine for fear of getting it out of adjustment."

Mysterious attachments suddenly took on attraction of new found toys as Miss Rhonemus demonstrated the ease and convenience of their many uses. Tape and rickrack were applied in one single stitching with an attachment common to all machines.

"I can see that the sewing machine will become the favorite toy in our house," Mrs. Houghton exclaimed. "My girls will call this fun."
