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### Your Day May 18

May 18 is "Your Day," a time when every voter can go to the polls and express his or her opinion, provided of course you are registered. According to the American Heritage Foundation you achieve three things when you go to the polls.

1—You have opportunity to declare your presidential preference. 2—You may have the biggest voice you will have all year in selecting congressional candidates. 3—You have opportunity to discharge your duty as a citizen of the community.

What does the primary achieve? 1—It indicates to the nation the present political sentiment of your state. 2—It helps candidates to determine the relative strength of an area. 3—It serves as a guide to political parties in their action and planning.

We are one of the free nations in the world where we are free to cast a secret ballot for the candidate of our choice. Let's keep the privilege alive by voting May 18.

### Your Choice Could Be Important

Regardless of politics, your choice as to the candidates you vote for might be important in the primary May 18. Your vote might help elect two local men and thus provide a better opportunity to participate in county government affairs.

As we have said before, we think it is highly desirable to give Jim Hemenway, democratic candidate for county commissioner, a big complimentary vote. Jim is capable and if elected in the general election, he could at least give this area impartial representation. Another is Ed Cooper, candidate for county superintendent on the non-partisan ballot. Cooper has been well grounded in the problems of rural schools, an essential knowledge for anybody who wants to fulfill the duties of county superintendent. In addition Cooper has the confidence of most of the rural school teachers in Lane county because he has been a rural teacher himself so long.

Some of the candidates for state and national offices are finding out that campaigning is an expensive business. Elmer Deetz of Canby, republican candidate for U. S. Senate, seems to have a good deal of good common horse sense, but has practically no chance of winning the nomination. One of the amusing things about Deetz's candidacy is that in a recent bulletin Deetz declared his chief expense was getting someone to milk for him while he was out campaigning. Both McKay and Phil Hitchcock, candidates for the U. S. Senate, are good men. Doug McKay recently declared that he came back to Oregon to make the campaign, strictly on his own initiative and that he was not taking orders from the higher ups. He was not convinced he should run for this office until he attended the funeral of the late Gov. Patterson. Then he received so much urging that he could not afford to turn it down.

According to many, Hitchcock will stand a better chance to beat Morse in the fall. Much of his financial support was withdrawn when McKay entered the race, which has seriously handicapped his efforts.

The democrats have only one candidate for governor, Robert D. Holmes of Astoria, but the republicans have two, Elmo Smith, present governor, and Earl Dickson of Albany, the "whipped republican." We will have to agree with the Dickson slogan, because the average voter becomes so confused after reading a few of Dickson's mimeographed pamphlets to the voters, he can't be sure just what Dickson is running for.

The democratic race in the fourth congressional district might be a tight one. Many say that Dave Shaw of Gold Beach has the edge over Charles Porter of Eugene.

We would favor the reelection of the five GOP legislators in the state legislature. We favor the election of Charles Woodrich for judge of the circuit court, second judicial district, who was appointed to this post when the office was created.

"Vote, but don't vote in the dark," is one of the slogans used in the current campaign for intelligent voting. You can cast a vote the way you want it by reading up on men and issue.

mers, taking to the woods in the winters. Sixty percent of the timber stands are privately owned and are logged by the owners. Twenty percent belongs to firms and the other 20% is state owned. Timber transportation in the past was done mostly by the rivers, but this has proven uneconomical because many of the logs sink. They have begun to use forest roads more, but will continue to use horses mostly for transportation.

### Reforestation Concern

The Norwegians remove only part of the trees and tractors would ruin those left to stand. In Norway there is more concern for reforestation. Many of the trees are logged for pulp when they are only breast high and six inches through, but these trees are 20 years old.

When the trees are 15 or 16 years old, they are thinned. It takes a tree around 10 years to grow in the North if it starts from natural reforestation but only about two years if it is planted. Trees in the North country grow from the roots of other trees.

### Planting Program

There is a large planting program in the western part of Norway, which is logged for export to England, Baltic Mountain Pine and Sitka Spruce are the main reforestation trees, because they grow faster than the Norwegian Spruce. Spruce is the most important wood for pulp. Hemlock is used as a windbreak for the other trees. The East coast has an abundance of forests, so reforestation is not as critical as in the west.

Ivar and Truls are working at Bohemia to learn the forestry practices of the United States. Ivar has been with Bohemia Lumber Company for a year and will return to Norway soon on the maiden voyage of the Bergens.

## Councilwoman Gallo Explains Water Department Operation At Chamber Meeting Tuesday

Hill Prefers City Manager System; Urges Expansion of Cottage Grove City Limits

Councilwoman Joan Gallo, Mayor Jess Hill, High School Principal Bob Dunsberry and Grade School Superintendent Jess Fasold were the speakers at the Chamber of Commerce luncheon meeting held at the Golf Club Tuesday noon. Following is the text of Mrs. Gallo's talk, pertaining to the water situation in Cottage Grove. Portions of the other talks conclude this article.

"Because of the critical nature of the expansion and improvement program of our city water department conducted during the past six years and even more critical problems of finance, I have chosen this segment of city problems to talk about today.

"With the assistance of consulting engineers the new water distribution program was started to keep pace with the times — a large program for such a small city — a costly program made even more so because reserves were built up in past years to soften the load.

"Expansion Program  
 "A \$300,000 expansion program was conducted with no increase in revenues to speak of, and although people cry long and loud about the high cost of water bills, this past year the water fund alone went \$25,000 in the red in spite of a valiant but futile effort of the city council the previous year to pull it out. When the budget for the current fiscal year was prepared, \$15,500 in tax money was transferred to the water department by charging the other funds for water. Many cities do this to aid in a growing program. This year, mostly due to the hue and cry about the plight of property owners, this amount was eliminated and taxes reduced from about \$100,000 to \$88,000. Other smaller cuts here and there made up the difference, plus a few thousand that may be able to be transferred back into the general fund at the end of the year to help reduce taxes. But this is only a makeshift.

### Water Rent Raise

"Instead of aiding the water department with tax money for the 1956-57 year, water rates inside the city will be raised \$1.00 and outside \$1.25 per month. This will bring in an additional \$24,000 annual revenue. No sewer charge is to be made on the increased rate. However, in a generous mood, council has authorized the residential minimum for five months — May through September — to be raised from 6,000 to 18,000 gallons. This will in some way cancel out the benefits to the city of increased rates. Also the elimination of tax money for the water department will be detrimental. A combination of tax money and increased rates would have solved the problem better.

### Critical Work Only

"There is no doubt in my mind that in the next year at least, or until the deficit is paid off, only critical work can be done in connection with the water lines of the city. If more than critical work is done, the debt will only grow larger. Actually increased water revenues will do little more than pay off the deficit. It may have to be paid off in more than one year. And what are the critical programs that should be carried out, some of which may have to be postponed?

"In the list of their importance they are as follows:

"The Row River crossing at an estimate of \$3500. For those of you who do not know the pipeline broke a short time ago and had to be fixed. Some of the line will have to be replaced. There are plans being studied regarding a new type of pipe — steel encased in concrete and wired on the outside. There are also problems of anchoring the line, and this may be anchored to bedrock, depending on what is found when excavation is made.

"Second is a new 4-inch line on 5th st. from Washington Ave. to Main St. at an estimated cost of \$1400.

"Third is a new 6-inch line on 7th street, Washington to Gibbs, at a cost of \$3200.

A Must for 1956-57  
 "These three items are a must for 1956-57.

"Fourth is a new 6-inch line on South Sixth St. from Quincy to the city limits, at a cost of about \$15,000.

"Fifth is a new 6-inch line on Third Street, from Adams to Quincy. If this street is paved the work will have to be done at the time of the paving work, cost estimated at \$4500.

"This totals \$27,600 and will probably have to be spread over more than one year.

"A new line is also badly needed on Main Street, east from the bridge and on Tyler Ave. from 14th st. to S. Tenth st. And there are many small lines in the west part of the city that should be replaced with larger lines.

Mr. and Mrs. Melvin Wiscarson visited Sunday with her folks, Mr. and Mrs. T. C. Buckingham, in Eugene.

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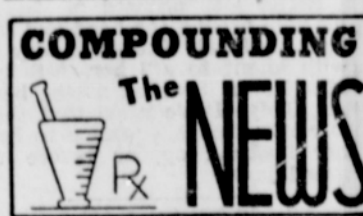
