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Veterans Loans For April 248

The Department of Veterans Affairs closed 153 home and farm loans in April totaling \$1,037,850 for the highest month since January, 1955. Director H. C. Saalfield reported recently. Loan applications for April amounted to 248, the highest for any month since August, 1954.

April loan closings brings to \$81,816,774, the amount of State of Oregon money loaned to World War II and Korean veterans for home and farm acquisition since 1945.

Eligible veterans may borrow up to \$9000 to purchase, refinance or build homes or \$15,000 to acquire farms, at 4 percent interest. The average loan in April was for \$6782.

The money is loaned to the veteran direct from the State of Oregon, through the Department of Veterans Affairs in Salem or Portland.

A recently added feature of the state loan program is a mortgage cancellation life insurance plan, designed to pay off a borrower's mortgage in event of his death. In the two months this plan has been in effect, the homes of three deceased veterans have been paid off in this way.

Veterans whose loans were closed since March 1 are automatically covered by insurance unless they refuse it. Veterans whose loans were closed before March 1 have until May 31 to apply for the insurance without having to prove insurability.

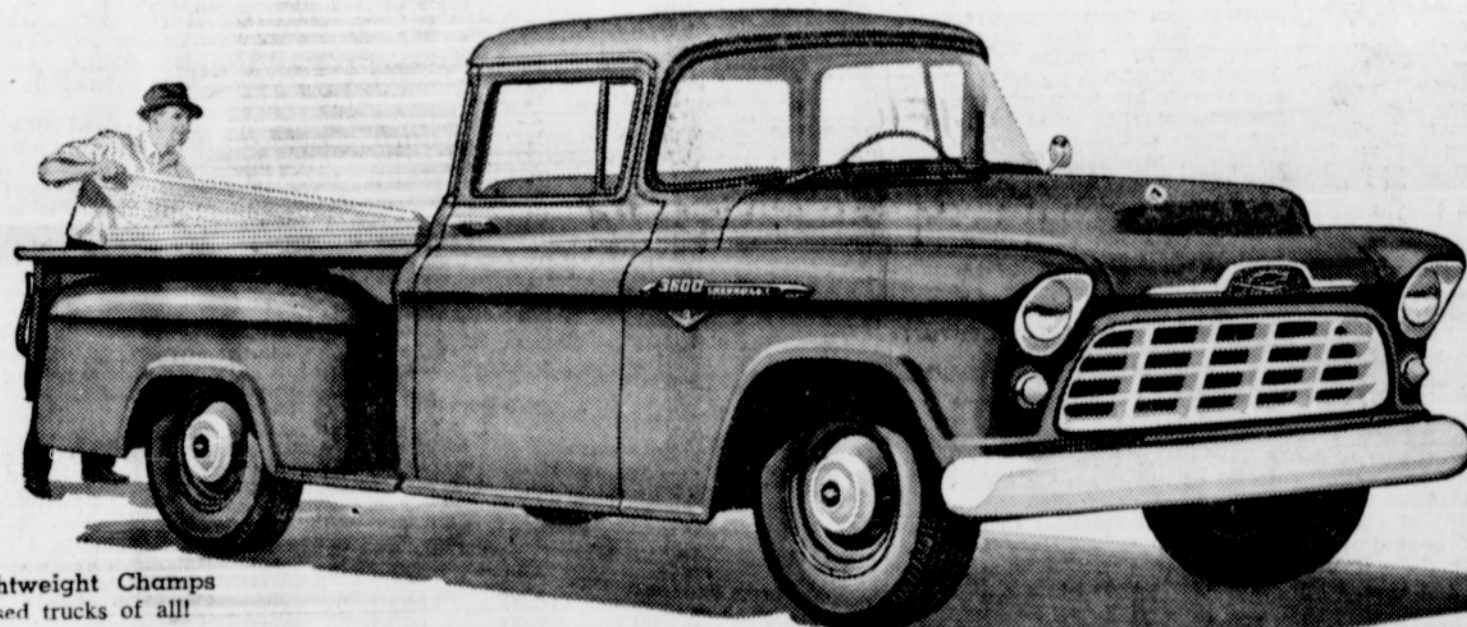
