Regulations Listed For Baker Bay Boat Race June 3

The following are regulations for fishing boat races to be held at Baker Bay of Dorena reservoir on Sunday, June 3, 7 miles east of Cottage Grove. Races will start at 1:30 p.m. Two classes of fishing boat races will be run—B fishing boat and combined C & D fishing boat. The regulations are as follows:

No metal or racing fins. Stock motors and lower units. Open exhausts if desired. Speed props may be used. Steering wheels and remote controls allowed. Keel minimum length 6 ft.; minimum width 3/4 in. Two keels may be combined to measure 6 ft. Two heats five laps each. Life jackets and crash helmets MUST be worn (helmets can be borrowed from other racers—jackets rented from Bill Hesse at race site). Minimum age limit—16 years.

B hull lengths, min. of 11 ft. 6 in., center line measure. B hull weight min. of 350 lbs. Class B motor cannot be more than 20 cu. in. displacement.

C and D hulls min. length 13 ft. 6 in. C hulls weighs min. 500 lbs. D hull weighs min. of 625 lbs. Class C motor cannot be more than 30 cu. in. displacement; Class D not more than 45 cu. in. Live or dead weight may be added. Scales will be found at race site.

Registration fee of \$2.00 plus 25 cents liability insurance must be paid for each race entered. Registration time is 11 o'clock. Drivers' meeting will be at 12 noon. Identification numbers (large enough to be seen from judges' stand during race) will be furnished those boats without any. Arrangements for these at time of registration.

Trophies will be given for 1st, 2nd and 3rd places in each race.

Bring your boat and motor to Dorena Dam or bring your motor and rent a boat at the race site. Have fun, run against your friends, Doctors, loggers, senators, ditch diggers or what-have-you (all amateurs) win a trophy!

In addition to the fishing boat races, there will be 12 heats of professional racing—48 and 136 inboards, B and D utility runabouts, B and D hydroplanes sponsored by Oregon Motor Boat Racing Association.

Cadet Examinations To Be Held July 9th

Washington, D. C. — Representative Harris Ellsworth announced recently that he has arranged with the Civil Service Commission to hold on Monday, July 9, 1956, a preliminary qualifying examination to determine the eligible candidates for appointment in 1957 to the U. S. Naval Academy, Annapolis, Maryland; the U. S. Military Academy, West Point, New York; and the Air Force Academy, Denver, Colorado.

Candidates for admission to the Academies must be not less than 17 years of age nor more than 22 years of age on July 1, 1957.

Candidates for these Academies must be actual residents of the Fourth Oregon District, which embraces Linn, Lane, Douglas, Coos, Josephine, Jackson and Curry Counties.

Applicants must notify Congressman Harris Ellsworth, 1130 House Office Building, Washington 25, D. C., in writing not later than June 5, 1956, of their desire to participate in the examination. Appointment of principals and alternates is based on grades achieved in the examination.
