

1956 Lions Break Many Track Records

Looking back over the 1956 Lion track season proves that track has been one of the more successful sports at Cottage Grove this year. The Lions placed second only twice this year and both times they were defeated by Marshfield, however in the District and county meets the Lions came out on top. Many new records were established this year. New records are as follows:

1 Mile: Dyrrol Burleson broke the record set by Jones in 1941 (4:37.6) with a time of 4:33.4. Shot Put Relay: The record set by Castle, Acheson and Larry Burleson last year fell to Dyrrol Burleson, Larry Burleson, and Jerry Northcutt with a distance of 139.7'.

440 Yard Relay: The record was set this year by Byron Angell, Grover Omyer, Ernie Rolison, and Bill Bryson with a time of 3:46.1.

2 Mile Relay: Ray Higginbotham, Leon Hayes, Frank Satterwhite and Dyrrol Burleson broke this one (9:02.7) set in 1953 with a time of 8:40.7.

1 Mile Relay: Fred Strebe, Frank Miller, Darrel White, and Grover Omyer set this one in a time of 3:44.4. The old one was established in 1953, 3:45.8.

Distance Medley: Frank Satterwhite 1/4 mile, Dan Simonsen 1/4 mile, Ray Higginbotham 1/2 mile, and Dyrrol Burleson 1 mile, ran it in 11:37.6. The old record set in 1951 was 11:42.5.

Two new records, due to new events, were set this year. They were in the Discus Relay (Castle, H. Martin and D. Martin—373'4") and the Javelin Relay (Childers, McCracken, and R. Northway—422').

Coach "Chick" Cicchetti says, "These records won't hold too long because we have lots of younger boys coming up who are willing to work hard. One Freshman boy, Dick Holmes, if he keeps improving, may break the record set by Al Martin in the 880."

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Jalopy Association To Meet June 6

The Cottage Grove Jalopy association will hold a business meeting in the council chambers of the city hall, Wednesday, June 6, to discuss the problem of insuring drivers under 21 and getting the association incorporated and fully insured.

About 50 per cent of the 33 members (with 23 jalopies) in the association are under 21, so a decision to vote them out would leave a weak organization. However, it has proven a serious problem for the group to obtain racing insurance for the minors.

The association is attempting to become incorporated and fully insured before the racing season at the Jaycee race track begins, in order to prevent the possibility of a law suit in case of an accident.

Frank Williams, president of the association, states that the main purpose of the racing association is to promote good clean sportsmanship. Thrills and excitement will be plentiful for the spectators, for the type of cars used will not be so much for speed, but for the punishment they can take.

The association feels that the cars are safe and the chance of injury is small. Each car is equipped with roll bars, safety belts, crash helmets and have all glass and upholstery removed.

Most of the drivers are inexperienced and are fairly evenly matched for competition.

Jefferson Seventh Graders Win Five Team Track Meet

The Jefferson school seventh grade track squad went out in a real blaze of glory last week, walking away with a five team meet at Springfield. The scores of the meet were Cottage Grove 80.1, Mill Street of Springfield 49.6, Thurston of Springfield 42, Willamette 32.7, and Springfield Jr. high 10.6.

The local seventh graders won four out of eight events and placed second in four events. They took the first three places in the shot put and first, second and fifth in the high jump, dominating these events.

DeWayne Toliver led the group, winning the 50 and 160 yard dashes and placing second in the broad jump. Tom Savage won the shot put and tied for second in the high jump. Ken Mathews was second in the pole vault.

Bob Johnson placed second in the shot put and low hurdles and fourth in the 330. Ron Gibson was third in the shot put. Mark Richards scored fifth in the low hurdles and Richard Miller was fifth in the high jump.

There was no pole vault event in the seventh grade meet, so Richard Miller and Larry Henningsgaard were entered in the eighth grade meet, both tying for first place.

Coach Ron Pupke stated that "the seventh graders did a very good job in this meet and all year. They had many good distances and times for seventh graders."

Eighth Graders 4th
The eighth graders placed fourth in the five-way portion of their meet. Springfield won with 85, followed by Willamette 79, Thurston 49, Cottage Grove 42, and Mill Street 41.

The two seventh graders, Miller and Henningsgaard and regular eighth grade pole vaulter Ward Johnson, claimed the only first, tying for the top spot in high jump with a Willamette boy at 8'6". These boys jumped as high as the ninth graders from the three Springfield schools. Johnson beat his previously best jump by six inches and Miller bettered his previous mark by a foot.

Other Grove placings were fourths in high jump by Jim Earl, in the low hurdles by Dick Giles, in the shot put by Ace Walters and in the 660 by Tom Sharek.

There were four fifths, Craig Hansen in high jump, Dennis Stringer in the low hurdles and Roger Divers in the broad jump and three-fourth mile. Leroy Hultberg placed sixth in the 660 and Leon Eastman claimed sixth in the 70 yard dash.

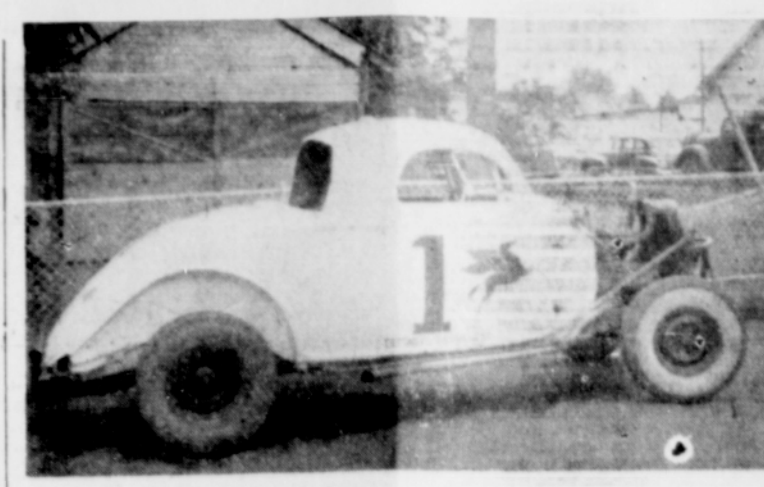

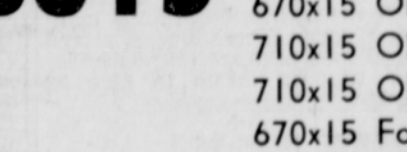
