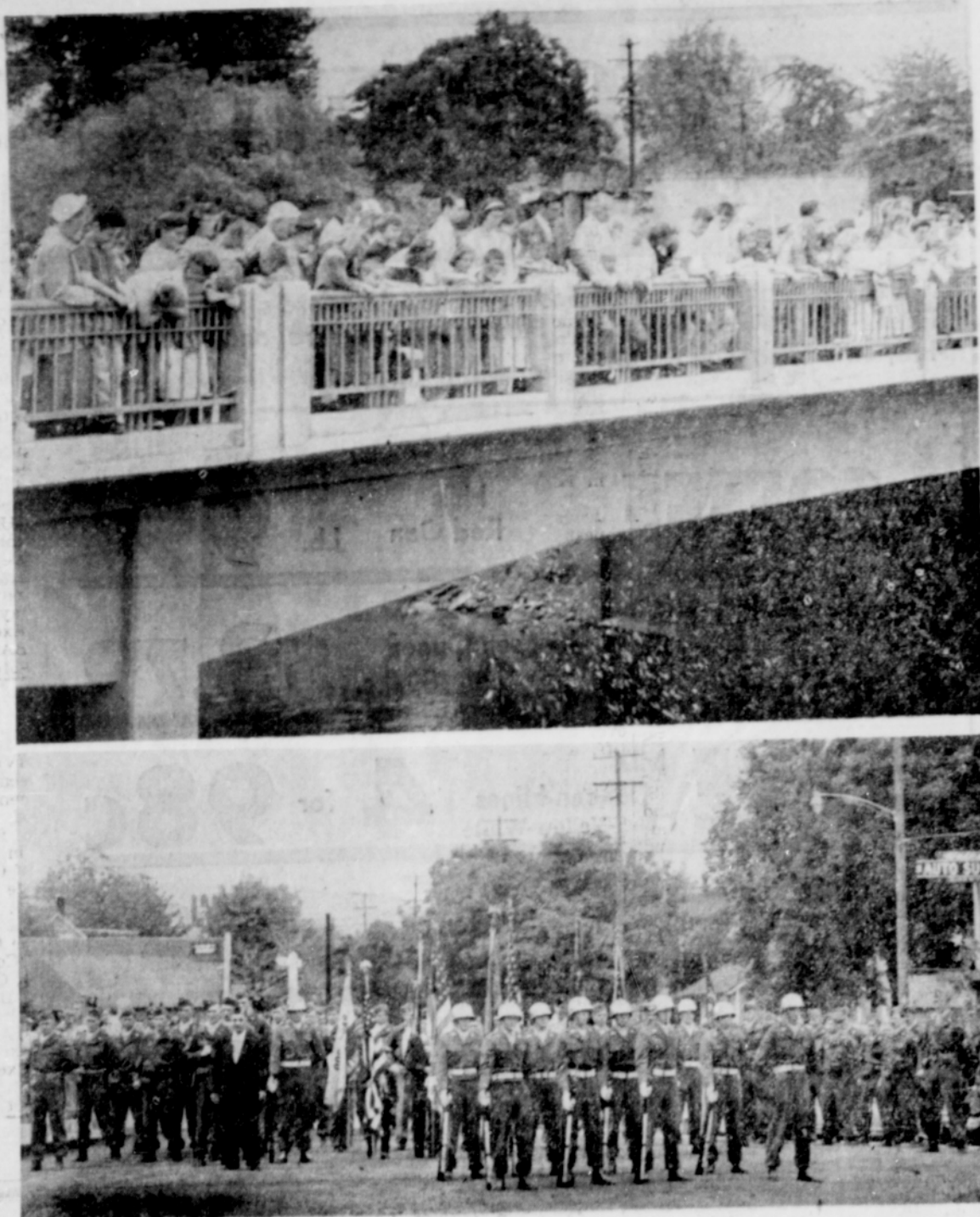

Orchardists Should Spray for Control The Coddling Moth

Orchard owners as well as "backyard" gardeners should spray their apple and pear trees immediately for control of coddling moths which are now emerging. W. B. Parker, extension agent, warned today.

If you have only a few trees mix spray at the proportion of 3 tablespoons of lead arsenate to a gallon of water. Orchard owners are advised to use 2 pounds of 50 per cent wettable DDT or 3 pounds of lead arsenate to 100 gallons of water.

"If spider mites are a problem," said Mr. Parker, "add 1 pound 25 per cent wettable parathion, or 1 pound EPN 340 or 2 pounds 25 per cent wettable malathion to the DDT or lead arsenate spray."

When pear psylla is present, Parker suggests use of parathion or malathion for control. Fungicides for control of apple and pear scab or mildew may also be included in the first cover spray.

Complete information on spray mixtures and spray schedules may be obtained from the Lane Extension Service by calling DI 5-8418. Copies of the bulletin "Spray Program Apples and Pears in the Willamette Valley" are also available upon request.
