CG Town Team Loses 2 Close Games 3-0, 2-1

The Cottage Grove town baseball team has been having trouble playing past the sixth inning lately and have been losing as a result of it.

Whether or not they would have won if the games had gone the full nine innings cannot be determined, but they lost 3-0 to Eugene, Sunday, in a game called in the sixth because of rain and fell 2-1 to Junction City at Eugene, Tuesday, when the late game was stopped because of curfew after the sixth inning.

Almost Perfect
It is doubtful that the local squad would have beaten Eugene, for opposing pitcher Don Siegmund allowed none of the 18 Grove batters he faced to touch first base, while fanning 10 of them. It could have well been a perfect game.

Grove pitcher Jim Sittser pitched no-hit ball until the fifth inning when third-baseman Clark Miller tripled, Paul Burgett walked and both scored on the only error of the game—a wild throw after Siegmund bunted. Siegmund scored the final run on Hank Hudspeth's sacrifice fly.

Sittser struck out 3, walked 3 and hit 1 batter but allowed no earned runs.

Outfit 7 to 3
According to the statistics, Cottage Grove should have beaten Junction City, for they out-hit them seven to three.

The Junction City squad got its first run in the third inning when Pollard scored on an error after two were out. The bases were loaded when Jim Sittser finally retired the side.

Grove threatened in their half of the third, with Sittser, Dwayne Carpenter and Bill Levings collecting singles, with two away, but Sittser was put out at home for the third out.

Don Tonole scored Grove's only run in the fourth, getting to second base on a pair of errors and scoring on a pair of singles by Bob Moore and Jack Weaver. Weaver was credited with the RBI.

In the sixth inning, Mortenson singled, went to second on a one-bagger and scored on an error for Junction City's winning run.

Threatened
In the Grove half of the sixth, Ernie Coen doubled and took third on Bob Moore's second hit of the day. Moore stole second base, but there they both stayed for JC pitcher Grady fanned the next two batters and Jim Sittser flew out to left field for the final out.

Moore led the batting with two for three and Ernie Coen's double was the only extra base blow of the day. Grove left seven runners on base to Junction City's six left.

Sittser gave up only three hits, struck out 11 batters, walked six and threw two wild pitches, but allowed no earned runs. Pollard gave up four hits, walked none and struck out one man in three and one third frame. The one run was not earned. Relief pitcher Grady gave up three hits, walked one and fanned five batters in two and two thirds innings.

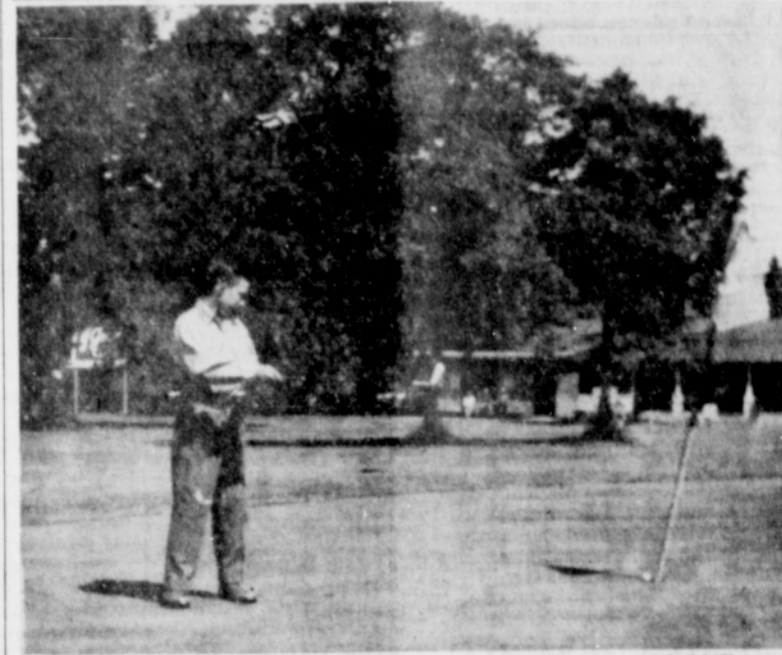

The Cottage Grove Junior Legion baseball team failed to register a win or even a score in their first two games this year, falling first to Lowell 2-0 there Wednesday, June 6, and then being edged out 1-0 by Springfield in a nine inning pitchers dual, there, Sunday.

Lowell pitcher Kenny Ward threw no hit ball against the local squad until Bob Brookhart hit a blooper behind second base, for Grove's only hit, in the fifth inning.

Ward struck out 11 men, walked two and allowed no runners past second base. Virg Merrill, pitching for Cottage Grove, fanned nine men, gave up only two hits and walked two men.

Coach Bob Green's local boys went scoreless again at Springfield, while Merrill scattered nine hits and held the host team at a deadlock until the second extra frame. In the ninth inning, Springfield pinchhitter Gordy Wright drove in Rick Herman with a single, winning the game. Don Prociw was the winning pitcher, allowing only five hits, while fanning three and walking the same amount. Merrill struck out three and walked four.

Rick Herman collected three hits for Springfield, while Bill Benson hit two for three for Grove. Other Grove hits went to Frank Jacobs, Ron Rice and Ernie Rolison.

Calapooya Archers Place Second In Tri-County Shoot

The Calapooya Archers of Cottage Grove placed second behind the Cascadian Bowmen of Eugene in the annual Tri-County team shoot at the high school Sunday, with a score of 2165. The Cascadians scored 2377.

The Eugene women also won with a score of 1779. High individual trophy for the men went to Ike Epperly of Eugene with 686, followed by H. D. Hunter, Eugene, 676 and Bruce Bush, Cottage Grove 654. Elaine Foster of the Roseburg Archers scored high for the women with 553. Ike and Fern Epperly of Eugene won the husband and wife trophy donated by the new Roseburg Archers, with a combined score of 1216.

Other men's scores were: Umpqua Bowmen of Roseburg 2078, Willamalane Archers of Springfield 1764, Benton Bowmen of Corvallis 1740 and Roseburg Archers 925.

Other women's scores included Roseburg 1454, Willamalane 1297 and Calapooya 1190. An incomplete Umpqua team scored 730.

Young People Will Need Cards For Social Security

Young people who intend to work this summer should be sure they have their Social Security cards in order. Dean Haley, district manager of the Social Security administration stated recently. He pointed out that nearly all jobs in this area are now covered by the Social Security act and employers need the Social Security numbers as well as the correct names of his employees to make the reports required of him by the government.

Mr. Haley noted that many employers have told him they do not let new employees start to work until their Social Security cards have been demonstrated. The Social Security number is the number of an account set up to determine rights to payments that may have an insurance value of as much as 30 or 40 thousand dollars, Mr. Haley explained. If wages are reported under an incorrect name or number or with no number at all, their rights may be seriously jeopardized.

Mr. Haley suggested the following actions to be sure that you will have no trouble in getting a job:

1. If you have never had a Social Security card and expect to work this summer, apply for an original card now so that you will have it when you are ready to go to work.

2. If you have had a Social Security card before but can't find it, apply for a replacement card.

3. If you have changed your name since you last applied for a Social Security card, apply for a card to show your Social Security number with your new name.

Mr. Haley cautioned that you should never have more than one Social Security number. You may obtain new cards with your number on it whenever you need one.

Target Oregon

(This is the seventh in a series of articles which describe the meaning of civil defense to people living in non-target areas).

The Air Force is responsible for air defense, and this includes the early warning system made up of radar stations and ground observer posts.

Warning is disseminated from Air Defense divisions by special telephone arrangements to six key point warning centers in Oregon, located at Portland, Salem, Eugene, Medford, The Dalles and Pendleton. From there, the calls fan out to warning points in each county, and then to the community level. The entire operation, which is tested regularly, is handled in a few minutes.

ALERT (for EVACUATION)
SIGNAL, which means attack is probable, is a steady blast of three to five minutes' duration. When you hear this, turn your radio to a Comelrad frequency (640 or 1240) and follow official instructions. Prepare to take shelter or evacuate, according to directions you will receive from local civil defense authorities.

TAKE COVER SIGNAL is a wailing tone, or a series of short

blasts, of three minutes' duration. When you hear this, it indicates that attack is imminent and you should take the best available shelter.

There is no public signal for "All Clear," which means danger of further attack is past. Civil defense authorities will notify you by other means when it is safe to leave your shelter.

A city devastated by an H-bomb could not recover through its own power. All available resources would be mobilized for a concentrated effort in the stricken area. While the target area still is staggering under the blow supplies and equipment must be dispatched from towns and cities hundreds of miles distant. To cities throughout Oregon would fall the burden of providing medical, police, rescue, utilities and other CD services. There would be two types of people: Those who NEED help and those who CAN help.

Vets Entitled to School Benefits

Oregon war veterans returning to summer school this week and next were reminded today of their possible entitlement to state educational aid benefits.

Raymond E. Pettey, educational officer for the state Department of Veterans Affairs, said eligible veterans should apply for their state benefits when they register in school.

Pettey also warned World War II veterans that December 31 is

the last day they may start schooling under the state program. There is no deadline for Korean veterans. Application for state aid may be made at the school, through county veterans' service officers, or from the state veterans' department, the administering agency, at State Finance building, Salem, or State Office building, Portland.

Veterans must have been Oregon residents for one year immediately prior to their service during World War II or the Korean conflict. Korean veterans must have served in the Korean theater.

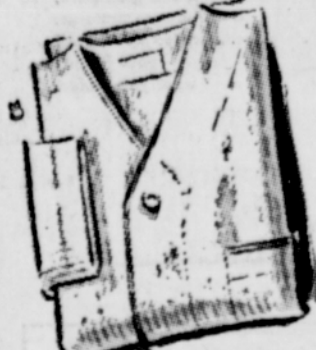

Moist Weather Cause Of Brown Rot Damage

Moist weather, such as Lane County is presently experiencing, can result in extensive brown rot damage to fruits if proper controls are not taken. W. B. Parker, Lane extension agent, warns.

"Cherry growers using lead arsenate spray or dust combined with sulphur for control of the fruit fly are protected from brown rot," he said. "Growers of peaches, apples and pears should spray their trees with a solution of 6 pounds wettable sulphur to 100 gallons of water. Dusting sulphur may also be used effectively."
