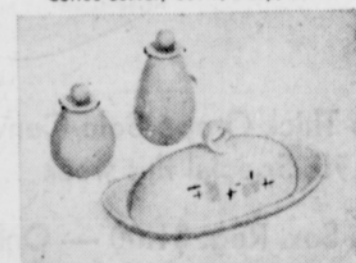
Mrs. Frank Stone has gone to Kemmerer, Wyo., to join her husband, who is in charge of construction of a sawmill there.
