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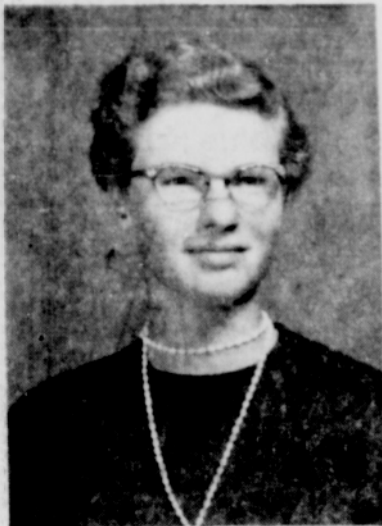

Ann Chapman, M. Longfellow Learn Citizenship at Girls State

When Oregon Girls State, the school of citizenship of the American Legion Auxiliary, opened at Willamette university, Salem, Monday morning, Cottage Grove was represented by Ann Chapman and Marie Longfellow. Both will be seniors next year at Cottage Grove High school. Another local girl, Sue Higdon, a graduate this year, is serving as a Junior Counselor.

Miss Longfellow is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Longfellow of 740 Birch avenue. Miss Chapman's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Larry Chapman of Route 1, Cottage Grove. Miss Higdon is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Phil Higdon.

The 240 girls in attendance from throughout Oregon constitute a mythical state for one week. They assume the duties of citizens by electing their own city, county and state officials, also state senators and representatives in accordance with Oregon law. They have set up their own city and county government. In their legislative they introduce, debate and pass bills. They also conduct court sessions.

Part of the session will be in the state capitol building. A governor will be elected and her inauguration will take place in the House of Representatives of the capitol Thursday (today) at 1:30 p.m. Guest speaker will be Governor Elmo E. Smith. Harold J. Warner, Chief Justice, will speak to the girls about the judicial branch of the government when they visit the state Supreme Court.

A program of civil defense will

be held and Mrs. Charles W. Gunn of Portland, Girls Nation chairman, will be a speaker. At close of the session two girls will be picked to attend Girls Nation in Washington, D. C. June 17 is closing day of the project.

Both girls have been very active in high school. Ann Chapman was secretary of the student body the past year and next year will preside as president of the student body, first girl elected to that post in the history of the school. She plays in the high school band and has been accompanist for the school choir. As an underclassman she won the outstanding award based on leadership, scholarship and citizenship. She is a member of National Honor Society.

Marie Longfellow's high school activities have centered largely around girls' sports. She served as treasurer of Girls Athletic Assn. during her junior year and has participated in girls' bowling. She is a member of Future Business Leaders of America and National Honor Society. In student body elections this spring she was elected treasurer of the student body for next year.

In addition both girls will represent the Cottage Grove school at the Second Student Council Workshop at Oregon State college August 12-17. Elected from executive council, their duties at the workshop will be to participate in the activities and then make reports on what they have learned to the student body in the fall.

Store Blankets and All Woolens Now Advises Agent

Store your precious wool blankets, sweaters, suits, and socks so they won't become a free meal for the moths, Miss Virginia Moorman, Lane extension agent, warns. "These hot, dry days are the ideal time to brush, wash, and air woolens," Miss Moorman said. "And when you store clean woolens in closed garment bags, you have little to fear from moths."

Moths, she said, are naturally attracted to clothing that are soiled with food and grease spots and perspiration. Moths also have a fondness for lint, dust, and dark places.

Nor should housewives be lulled with the false security that moths don't eat blends of wool with synthetics. Tests show that blends may be damaged most of all. In order to satisfy his appetite for animal fibre, the moth must eat more of the blended fabric.

In addition to careful cleaning of garments prior to storing for the summer season, additional protection may be given through chemical treatments.

Entomologists from Oregon State college recommend solutions containing 5 per cent DDT. Miss Moorman said, "Chlordane or lindane are also commonly used for control of moths. Directions for any of these should be followed according to the manufacturer's specifications."

Best Buys in Food For Spring Months

Build spring meals around plentiful foods now on Oregon markets and you'll eat well on a trim budget.

Zelma Reigle, Oregon State college consumer education specialist, passes along this market information about supply, cost and variety as she sees it from visiting Oregon food stores.

Juicy roast beef and lean pork are in most meat markets in an assortment of cut and prices. Recent feedlots and a big fall pig crop, 12 percent higher than last year's, assure continuing good prices on pork and beef during April and May.

Although Oregon - produced fruit supplies are fairly quiet,

there are still some apples in local grocery stores. Citrus fruits remain in abundance on most fruit counters. Grapefruit and oranges, two of the most popular, add tartness to fruit cups and are good appetite-whetters when served at breakfast. Vitamin C, abundant in citrus fruits, builds up the blood and makes gums healthy, besides being a good tonic for spring fever.

In canned goods, Blue Lake green beans are spotted as a bargain by the OSC specialist. Northwest production of Blue Lakes reached an all-time high last year making a greater stock of canned beans available.

Fresh produce from southern states is arriving in local markets daily. Strawberries from California, tomatoes from Florida and Mexico, and pears from Texas are already in local stores. Prices are fairly high, but as supplies increase, prices will improve. Miss

Reigle explains.

Tender, new green, red and purple cabbages are an easy way to provide low-cost vegetable servings. Difference in price between the colors is slight, so try all three kinds, she suggests.

Large Grade A and Grade AA eggs continue as good buys at about 57 to 59 cents dozen. Medium size Grade A's are one to two cents a dozen less than the large size. Large eggs are the best buy when there's such a small difference between the price dozen of the two sizes, says Miss Reigle.

Rodent Displays

Display cases showing 13 of Oregon's most common rodents and small predatory animals may be borrowed from the Lane County Extension Service office, 1170 Pearl Street, for exhibition in

Lane County schools or at meetings of groups interested in identifying these animals.

"These cases were prepared in response to the general demand from rural people for more information regarding these animals," explained W. B. Parker, Lane extension agent. "Identification and knowledge of these animals are necessary if we hope to control them. No other state has a greater variety of these pests, and in proportion to the value of crops produced, probably no other state suffers more serious losses from predatory animals."

Mr. Parker noted that the displays hold considerable interest for students in both rural and city schools, and serve as excellent source material for program chairmen of rural organizations. The cases have already been on display at the River Road Grade school, and several granges have reserved the cases to use in future programs.

The 13 animals which Don Dickey, Eugene rodent control officer, mounted for the display include the Norway rat, mountain beaver, pocket gopher, wood rat, white footed mouse, meadow mouse, house mouse, chipmunk, pine squirrel, silver gray squirrel, gray digger or Douglas ground squirrel, flying squirrel, and mole.

A booklet, "Controlling Rodent and Other Small Animal Pests in Oregon," available from the Lane County extension office, is suggested for use with the display. It describes the life history of the rodents, and offers suggestions for their control.

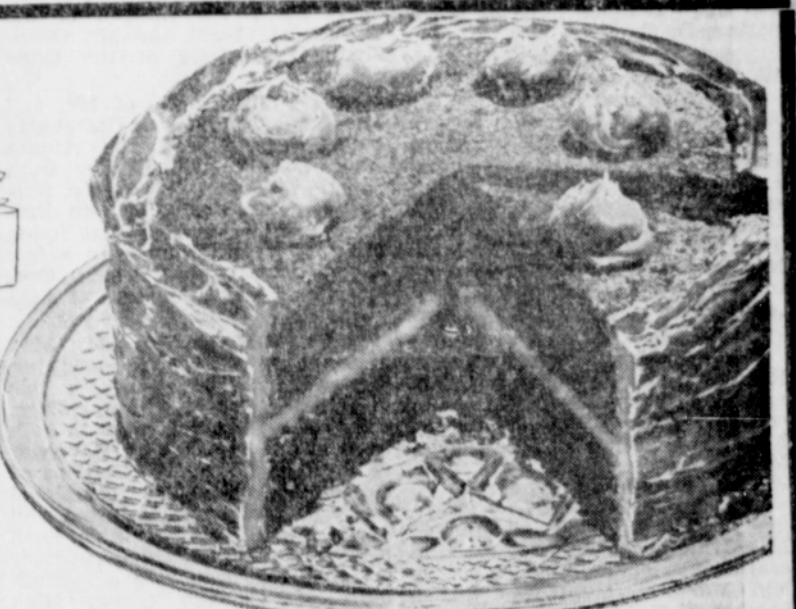
