NO INFORMATION Available on Soil Bank Program Yet

According to H. H. Myers, Chairman of the Lane County ASC committee, the County ASC office does not yet have sufficient information on the soil bank programs to give answers to questions regarding them.

Mr. Myers explains that the county committee does know that it is to administer the programs of which there are two: (1) the acreage reserve, applicable to land on which there are wheat acreage allotments; (2) the conservation reserve, which is to be applicable to other land than that under wheat acreage allotments.

Myers, with Max Nielsen, vice chairman, and Ted Allison, regular member of the county committee, and Earl Britton, office manager, plan to attend a district meeting at Salem today to learn the details of and procedure for handling the acreage reserve.
