Mrs. Galen Jordan of Gold Beach, who spent several years in Japan when her husband was stationed there as a chaplain with the occupation forces, presented the program for Eugene Button Club at a meeting held here Thursday, June 14, at the home of Mrs. W. L. Workman. Mrs. Edith Woods was hostess. Luncheon was served preceding the program.

Mrs. Jordan took "Kimonos" for her subject and exhibited many kimonos for both men and women, as well as yardage materials suitable for kimonos for persons of all ages. She had many Satsuma buttons on display as well as many other articles brought back from Japan.

The present style of kimono in Japan, she told club members and their guests, dates back 200 years. In that time there has been little change. 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Dinner Honors Scottish Minister

A dinner was held at the First Presbyterian church of Cottage Grove on Tuesday, June 19, in honor of the Rev. James Jack who is the visiting minister to the church while the pastor, the Rev. D. Hugh Peniston, is in Scotland. The dinner was organized by the Session of the church and was attended by all elders, trustees and past trustees, the Sunday school superintendent, and the youth advisor. Circle 2 was in charge of the arrangements and Mrs. Charles Beidler decorated the tables with some beautiful flowers.

Mr. Jack arrived wearing his kilt, which is the official kilt of the Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders, and the tartan is that of Cameron of Erracht. He was escorted to the center of the U shaped table by Mrs. R. A. Trask, a member of the Session and also the daughter of one of the earliest pastors of the church, the Rev. W. V. McGee. Mrs. Trask is also a member of the Veatch family on her mother's side, and is therefore a descendant of one of the founders of the church in Cottage Grove, as was said by Roy Lyon, senior member of the present Session and it was followed by the whole group singing "Blest Be The Tie That Binds."

After an enjoyable dinner of fried chicken and many dishes which were new to Mr. Jack, and which he seemed to appreciate, an official welcome was given to him by Mayor Jess Hill, chairman of the board of trustees. This was followed by other words of welcome which included explanation of their activity in the church by Harold Wolfard, member of the Session; Mrs. Archie Walker, Sunday school superintendent; Mrs. Warren Hansen, Westminster Fellowship advisor; Mrs. Roy Short, past president of the Women's association, who spoke of its work in the absence of the president, Mrs. Claude Cruson; and Mike Siebert, also a member of the Session who gave a highly amusing speech in his own inimitable fashion, closing on a more serious note with the expression of his agreement with the people of Lochwinnoch, Scotland, that this is not merely an exchange between two pastors, but the beginning of a friendship between two towns which may be of lasting value.

Mr. Jack then thanked everyone for the warmth of the welcome he had received, and of the pleasure with which he looked forward to his visit here, although the first few days were a little confusing as he tried to learn so many new names and new customs.

After the dinner everyone sent a message to the Penistons on a Dictabelt which will be mailed to them at once so they can play it back. Then they listened to the beginning of Mr. Peniston's diary, also on a Dictabelt, and Mr. Jack may also send a message to his congregation in a similar way. After a chance to mingle with the crowd and meet everyone, Mr. Jack saw a program which is now legendary in the Presbyterian church, "The Three Sisters Wilderness Expedition of 1955." This is a series of exceptionally beautiful color slides taken on a trip made by "Colonel" Mike Siebert and "Everest" Peniston, and is accompanied by a running commentary on the tape recorder by the two members of the expedition, a commentary which is very amusing as one is recorded without the knowledge of the other.
