Tips on Touring

Animals and birds—delightful as scenery on a motor trip—can present problems for the driver. Sometimes a startled deer charges in front of a car, or a bird will fly into a windshield. In the south west, snakes seeking left-over warmth at night on paved roads may become entangled in the car's working parts.

No driver likes to hit an animal. It's unpleasant, it can be dangerous, and it's often wasteful. For example, skunks, frequent highway visitors, are important to our food supply since they feed off insect beetles which destroy crops. And birds help keep the insect population under control.

You can protect yourself and our animal friends by following these simple rules:

1. Blink your lights at a steady beam will hypnotize them into immobility. Warn them of your approach in the daytime by honking the horn; they may literally become scared stiff if startled.

2. Warn birds along a fence by honking your horn. When you are too near they become agitated and are liable to head into the car.

3. Slow down when you see a herd-type animal crossing the road. One such animal crossing the road will usually be followed by others.

4. Be on the lookout when driving through recently harvested farm land. Animals are likely to be on the move in search of new food sources.

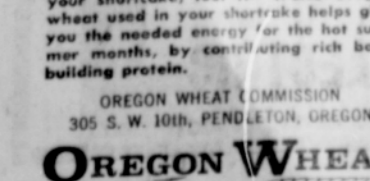
Shortcake Biscuits
