Investment Club Formed Recently

Orlo Bagley's Brother Presumed Drowned After Rescue Attempt

Bert Bagley, a 46-year-old Vancouver, Washington grain inspector and brother of radio station KOMB owner Orlo Bagley, was lost in the surf at Ilwaco, Washington, Sunday and presumed drowned, while trying to rescue 15-year-old Carol Veach of Vancouver.

Witnesses said that the tragedy occurred five teenage girls, on an outing at the beach, encountered trouble in the surf as incoming waves knocked them down.

Bagley rushed into the water and managed to get two of the girls to shore. Two others managed to scramble back onto the beach but Bagley and the fifth girl were swept to sea by the waves.

The girls were with a party of 11 Campfire Girls from Vancouver's Hudson Bay High school. Bagley had gone to the beach to drive some of the girls home from their weekend holiday.

Orlo Bagley left for Vancouver immediately after hearing the news. At last notice, the body of his brother had not been found yet.
