The 3 p.m. wedding took place in a setting of rhododendron, syringa, blue delphinium, and pink roses. Jean Ellen Sherrill, sister of the bride, was the maid of honor and Robert Tank, the groom's brother, was best man. The bride was given in marriage by her father.

The couple, both graduates of Cottage Grove High school, will be at home at 857 Gaines st., Salem. Mr. Tank was graduated recently from Oregon Technical institute. He will work as a commercial artist in Salem.

The bride wore a princess style, street-length dress of white nylon over white satin with silver slippers and white nylon gloves. She wore an illusion veil with a headband trimmed with seed pearls. She carried an old Bible with a white orchid and satin streamers.
