

## Legion Edges Lowell 7 to 6

The Grove Junior Legion baseball team edged Lowell 7-6 in a league game there Wednesday, June 27, although only one opposing batter managed to get a hit off Leon Hayes. Most of Lowell's runs came as a result of eight men walked by Hayes.

The local boys took a 3-1 lead in the opening inning. Hayes and Ernie Rolison got on base through a pair of errors and were driven in by a single knocked by Ron Rice. Rice was put out on a fielders choice that put Virg Merrill on first and Gary Johnson drove Merrill in with a single.

The Grovers advanced the score to 4-1 in the third, when Merrill sacrificed Rolison home. Lowell tied the score in the fourth inning, when Hayes gave up three consecutive free passes to first base. Cottage Grove's winning runs came in the fifth inning. Hayes and Rolison opened the inning with singles. ## CG Legion Splits With Springfield In Doubleheader

The Grove Junior Legion battled through two close baseball games against Springfield here Sunday, losing the first 3-2 and winning the second 5-3.

**Left 3-2**  
In the opening game of the doubleheader, Grove grabbed a 2-0 lead in the first inning and held it through the fourth. The two runs were scored when Ron Rice slugged a long triple that drove in Leon Hayes and Ernie Rolison, who had singled previously. Springfield pitcher Clarence then settled down and allowed only one hit for the remainder of the seven inning game—a single by Frank Jacobs in the seventh.

Springfield made the score 2-1 in the fifth and added the winning runs in the sixth.

**Won 5-3**  
In the second game, Ron Rice got aboard through an error, took second when Jacobs walked and was driven in by Virg Merrill's single, giving Grove a 1-0 temporary lead in the first inning. Springfield bounced back to tie the score in their half of the first and added another run, to lead 2-1, in the second.

In the third inning, Rice slugged a triple with Rolison aboard, to tie the score. Springfield went ahead again 3-2 in the fourth and held the lead until the final inning.

In the seventh, three straight Grovers, Jim Hoover, Jack Mullen and Bill Benson, were walked, loading the bases. Leon Hayes then hit into an error scoring Hoover to deadlock the game 3-3. Rolison followed with a single that sent Mullen and Benson scampering across the plate and won the game.

## Game Publications Available Now

One new and one revised edition on Oregon's big game animals has been added to the series on Oregon's fish and wildlife, the game commission announced recently. The publications in booklet form are titled "Oregon's Elk" and "Oregon's Big Game Resources" and were written by R. U. Mace, chief of big game management, and freely illustrated by Harold Cramer Smith, game commission staff artist. The publications are available to the public free of charge.

The new publication on Oregon's elk gives descriptions, characteristics both the Rocky Mountain and Roosevelt species. Mace goes back into the history of elk in Oregon showing how the populations have fluctuated periodically, discusses food habits, inimical factors, and gives a comprehensive picture of the information necessary on which to base a progressive management program.

Of interest to sportsmen will be the chapter on the proper hunting methods to insure the best chances of success. Elk are elusive animals but knowing their habits and normal responses when pursued improves the hunter's chances. Mace also discusses the proper methods of skinning, care of the meat, and the trophy if it is desired.

The publication on Oregon's big game resources is a revised edition first published in 1952 and has been brought up to date. The booklet covers all big game animals of the state which includes the Rocky Mountain and Roosevelt elk, the mule deer, the black-tailed deer, the white-tailed deer, and the pronghorn antelope. The booklet gives a brief history of big game in Oregon, a description of species, and their range, and the information and management program. Mace also looks into the future of big game in Oregon with a view of what to expect in the days to come.

## Water Safety Rules Stressed

A rash of water accidents since the general fishing season opened have placed tragic emphasis on the importance of water safety precautions, the Oregon Game Commission said recently. Newspaper clippings—the only source of records—show that 12 persons have already lost their lives through drowning in the past two months while fishing on Oregon's lakes and streams.

Six of these tragedies occurred on streams when persons either slipped from moss covered rocks or ventured too far and were swept into deep holes by strong river currents. The other six drownings were from boating accidents, two of which occurred on swift moving rivers, and the remaining four from capsized boats on high mountain lakes.

The game commission reminds sportsmen that at this time of the year streams are high, running with tremendous speed and force. In addition, rocks on the stream bottom are slick with moss or other algal growth which makes wading extremely hazardous. Under such conditions, wading is next to impossible, or at best, a precarious undertaking.

Boatmen on lakes and reservoirs are also cautioned to watch the weather constantly. Sudden spring storms and squalls can arise almost without warning. Navigation in bad weather is difficult, and swamping of the boat often occurs.

The commission recommends the following code for water safety:

1. Avoid wading in swift current if the water is more than knee deep, particularly if you are wearing boots or waders. If you must cross a fast stream, carry a long stiff pole as a safety aid.
2. Avoid overloading any boat. Rowboats 14 feet long or less should never carry more than three people.
3. Never stand up in a boat.
4. When boating on a large stream, avoid swift riffles and whirlpools.
5. When fishing from a small craft on a lake, head for the nearest shore line immediately if the wind starts to blow. Check the skyline and wind behavior often and systematically and head for the nearest shore BEFORE a squall hits.
6. Never go out in a boat unless it is capable of floating when capsized, and don't leave without a life preserver for every person aboard. Put them on immediately at the first sign of danger.
7. If a boat capsizes, always try to catch hold of the boat and stay with it until help arrives.
8. Never wear boots or waders when riding in a boat.
9. Avoid shore off with motor boats. Don't make sharp turns at high speed or pass other boats without proper clearance.
10. If caught in a storm on open water, run the motor at slow speed and across the waves. Sit in the bottom of the boat for maximum stability.
