Former Cottage Grove Resident Married In Roseburg June 17

Joan Elizabeth Webb, former Cottage Grove resident, became Mrs. Stanley Edward Blinkhorn in a double ring ceremony held at St. George's Episcopal church in Roseburg Sunday, June 17.

The new bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Percy B. Webb, now of Myrtle Creek. The Webbs moved from Cottage Grove about a year-and-a-half ago. Mr. Webb was the owner of Grove Hardware here.
