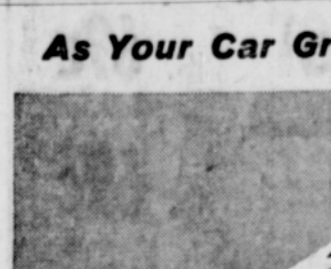

Coast Guard Takes 6 Months Enlistees

Here's some good news for young men who would like to serve with the United States Coast Guard. Officials of the Thirteenth District are pleased to announce a new recruiting program whereby a young man would serve only six months active duty.

The purpose of the plan is twofold. To build a strong Coast Guard reserve and to let young men take care of their service obligation with a minimum of active duty time.

The six month plan is especially attractive to a young man who desires to enter and complete college or enter into his chosen work without interruption to fulfill his military requirement.

Enlistment in this program is now available to young men who are between the ages of 17 and 18½ years of age; are high school graduates, or within three months of graduation, or have ceased to pursue a course of instruction in high school; reside within reasonable commuting distance of a Coast Guard Reserve Training Unit.

Seed and Produce Field Man to Work Out of Eugene

Gordon Schwalen, seed and produce fieldman for the state department of agriculture, has been transferred to Eugene and will work out of his home at 107 Harbor Drive.

Sgt. Stokes Second In Marine Shoot

Days of Steam Are Fast Fading For Railroads

The vanishing steam locomotive which once ruled America's railroads got another nudge toward oblivion recently.

Southern Pacific, one of the nation's predominately diesel-powered roads with but relatively few steam engines still in service, announces it is earmarking an additional \$24 million for more diesels.

Last year the railroad put in \$34 million order for 185 units, all of which already have been placed in service.

D. J. Russell, president of Southern Pacific, said the railroad will now add another 154 units, all to be delivered by the end of next April. Included will be 90 freight diesel units and 64 switchers.

The additional units, he said, will increase SP's diesel fleet to 2,600 locomotives, displacing 3 million horsepower and an approximate outlay of \$313 million. "But the investment has been worth every cent," declares Russell, who is steering Southern Pacific toward complete dieselization by about the end of 1958.

BRAND INSPECTORS TRAINING SCHOOL BEGINS JULY 11

The first annual school for brand inspectors employed by the state department of agriculture will be held July 11-15 at Pringle Falls in Deschutes county. The school will be in two sections, with 45 inspectors attending each section.

The training session has two aims: to acquaint the 90 brand inspectors throughout the state with each other and to assist in uniform handling of inspection problems.

"We believe if our brand inspectors learn each other's problems, both their work and the Oregon livestock industry as a whole will benefit," says M. E. Knickerbocker, chief of the department's animal husbandry division.

Knickerbocker and Roy K. Nelson, department livestock brand supervisor, are directing this training session. Chester B. Liechty and E. L. Wright of the division staff are supervising program arrangements.

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OSC to Test New Forage Crop Pest Control Chemical

A new "highly effective" chemical for control of insect pests in forage crops is scheduled for test this summer by Oregon State college scientists to see if the treatment livestock feed results in any harmful residues in meat, eggs or milk.

The possible boon to hay and pasture crop production needs only clearance with the U.S. department of agriculture food and drug administration as a safeguard of human health. It has already been shown that animals are not harmed by amounts of the chemical needed to control the pests.

OSC was selected by Shell Chemical corporation, manufacturers of the product, for a \$35,250 research grant to complete tests before January 1 for an FDA ruling on commercial distribution of the material.

The grant will be administered through the agricultural research foundation at the college, according to R. W. Henderson, assistant director of the OSC agricultural experiment station.

Varied dosages of the chemical will be used this summer in feed for about 50 head of dairy and beef cattle, hogs, and sheep, and 50 laying hens and fryers. Milk and eggs will be tested each week for traces of the chemical. FDA is especially stringent on purity of milk because of its wide use as an infant food.

Half of the meat animals will be slaughtered at the end of a 12-week feeding period and chemical tests made of tissue. The remaining animals, along with the dairy cows and poultry, will be tested for an additional four to six weeks on feed that is free of the insecticide to learn if possible residue deposits decrease.

OSC scientists heading the project are L. C. Terriere, agricultural chemist, George Arscott, poultry husbandman; David England, animal husbandman; and Roger Sprowls, dairy researcher.

Glenn Perkey Low Bidder on Dorena Reservoir Cleanup

Glenn Perkey, Cottage Grove, Friday submitted a low bid of \$9,900 when bids were opened by the Portland District, Corps of Engineers, for debris clean-up at Dorena reservoir on the Row River, 22 miles southeast of Eugene. There were five bidders.

Government estimate for the work was \$12,200. Work must be completed by December 31.

Other bidders were: R. L. Doolittle, Cottage Grove, \$10,997; Hanley Salvage Co., Longview, Wash., \$18,500; C. H. Stout and E. H. Stockdale, Cottage Grove, \$11,750; and Carlisle and Scott, Springfield, \$11,900.

SOIL BANK AGREEMENTS AVAILABLE
The County ASC Office now has copies of the Soil Bank acreage reserve agreements available for signature by farmers wishing to participate in the program according to H. H. Myers, chairman of the Lane county agricultural stabilization and conservation committee. A short visit to the office will provide interested farmers with full information on terms and conditions of participation in the Acreage Reserve, which is the first part of the program to get under way this year.

"Growers interested in taking part in the acreage reserve have until July 20 to sign the Soil Bank agreements, designating the acreage of wheat which they wish to include under the reserve," Chairman Myers states.

Wheat Quota Coming Up
Friday, July 20, is the date when growers will determine how they want to market their 1957 wheat crop. H. H. Myers, chairman of the Lane county agricultural stabilization and conservation committee, reminded farmers recently.

Farmers who will harvest more than 15 acres of wheat or grain on a farm in 1957 are eligible to cast ballots in the wheat quota referendum. Polling places will be set up in convenient locations in the county, and wheat growers will be notified where they may vote.

H. H. Myers, chairman of the Lane county ASC committee is urging all farmers who have already signed up for a seeding practice to make certain that they have sent the soil sample or samples, as required, to the Oregon State College Soils Testing Laboratory.

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Mr. Myers also urges those who anticipate signing for a seeding practice to get their soil samples in early in order to prevent congestion in the laboratory and avoid any possibility of having the application disapproved.

Game Commission Opposes Splitting Of USFW Service

In action taken at a recent meeting, the Oregon Game Commission drafted a resolution vigorously opposing legislation now before congress which would divide the United States Fish and Wildlife Service and set up a separate bureau of fisheries.

In drafting the resolution, the commission felt strongly that national fish and game matters could be administered most effectively within a single coordinated agency as now exists and that congress should take steps to strengthen the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service rather than tear it down.

Game director Schneider stated that unprecedented procedure accompanied the action in that it was implemented without an opportunity of the responsible fishery management agencies of the states or the many conservation organizations of the nation having full knowledge of its effects on existing state-federal programs in the fish and game field.

In Oregon, numerous important activities such as river bank work, Dungeness, Johnson programs, cooperative research unit programs, and others are pursued jointly under well established procedures. What effect this change will have on these and related programs are unknown to this commission, Schneider said.
