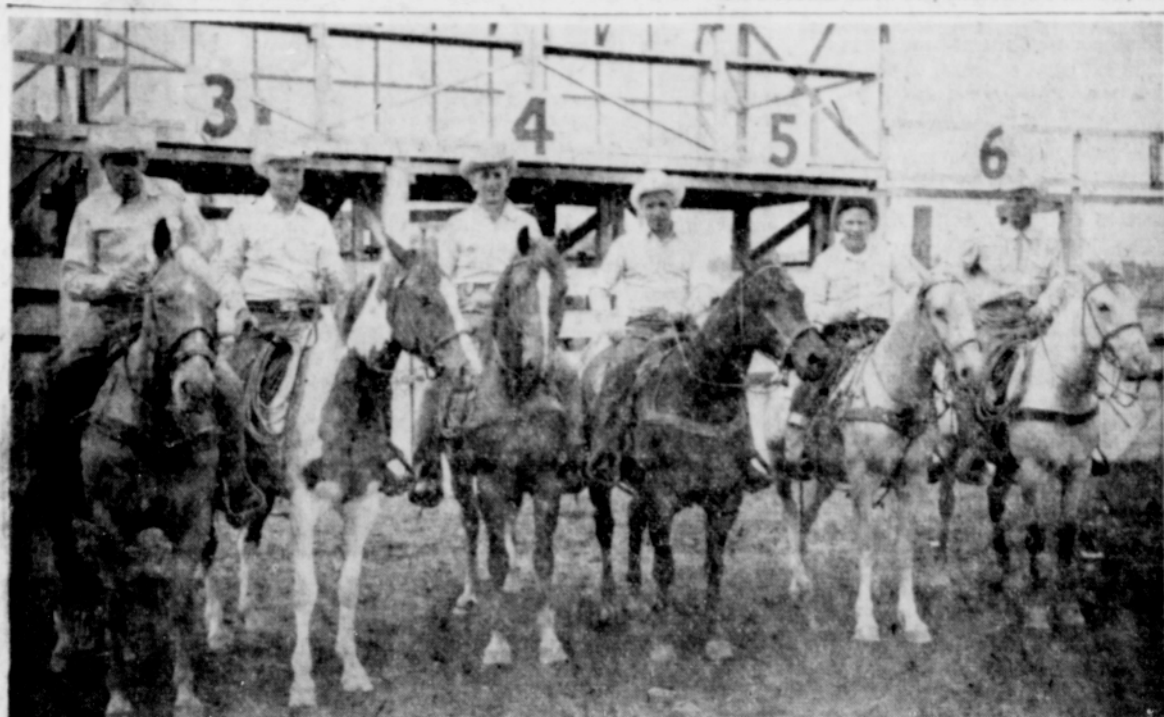

Conservation Project Explorer Scouts Develop Access Site

Anglers can thank the Paul Bunyan District Explorer Scouts for the development of a new access site on the Nehalem river. The site the Charnley access located about three miles downstream from the Sunset highway bridge near Elsie.

Frank Charnley, owner of the property, recently signed a 10-year agreement with the Oregon Game Commission generously giving permission to anglers to fish along the mile and a quarter of stream bordering his land.

Upon hearing of the Charnley access, the Paul Bunyan Explorers deemed the project a worthy conservation undertaking and volunteered their services to do all development work. On the day scheduled, ten Paul Bunyan stalwarts and their three leaders converged on the Charnley home loaded with shovels, post hole diggers, pick matts, rakes, and machetes, not to mention sleeping bags, tents, and enough groceries for the 2-day camp-out.

scouts completed the development in less than seven hours. Crushed rock was spread over the parking area to give anglers a firm surface to pull off the road. Two trails were built leading to the river, one leading to the upper end of the access and the other to the lower end. One trail more than one-quarter mile in length had to be hacked out of the side of a steep embankment where in several places rustic log steps had to be installed down the steeper inclines. Trails were covered with gravel to keep them stable. The development was completed when signs were erected directing anglers to the trails and to the upper and lower ends of the access project.
