Mrs. Maggie Wood of 246 S. River Road died at her home Saturday, July 7, 1956. She was 76.

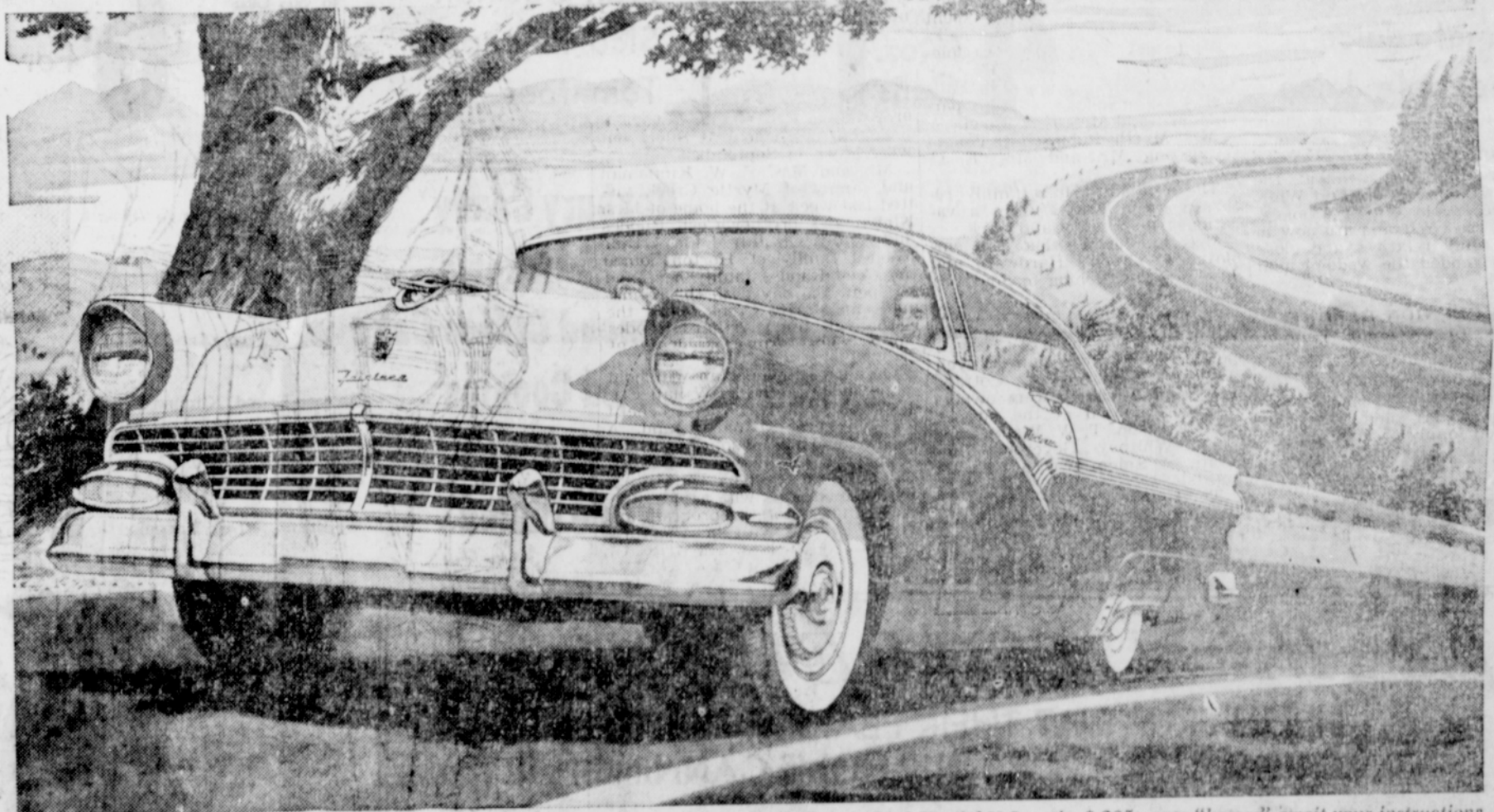
