City and District Swim Meets Slated for Cottage Grove Pool

Swimming news this week is the announcement of three meets in preparation for the Register Guard championship meet in Springfield August 23.

The first annual city meet will be held at 1 p.m. July 28. The sub district qualifying meet will be held August 14 and the sub district meet August 18.

At the August 18 meet Cottage Grove and Drain swimmers will compete for the first two positions in each division. Those winners will swim in the South Lane-North Douglas meet at Springfield.

The various divisions are: Girls and boys under 8, 20 yard free style, and front and back diving; girls and boys 9 and 10, 25 yard free style, 100 yard back stroke, and front and back dive; girls and boys 11 and 12, 50 yard free style, 50 yard back stroke, 50 yard breast stroke, and front, back and cut-away dives.

Boys and girls 13 and 14, 100 yard free style, 50 yard back stroke, 50 yard breast stroke, and front, back and cut-away dives; boys and girls 15 and 16, 100 yard free style, 100 yard back stroke, 100 yard breast stroke, and front, back, cut-away and half twist dives.

Ribbons will be given for the first three place winners in each division. Every group except 8 and under will compete at the Springfield meet.

Those interested in competing in the city or sub-district meets may leave their names now at the pool. One person may enter any number of events in his age group.

On Saturday night, September 8, the San Francisco 49ers will make their initial Portland appearance when they clash with the New York Giants.

Two weeks later, September 22, the Los Angeles Rams will play a return engagement with the Pittsburgh Steelers.

The 49ers, under new head coach Frankie Albert, have what is considered the most explosive backfield in pro football.

The Rams, defending champions in the western division of the national football league, will try to duplicate their 38 to 24 win over the Steelers in a touchdown thriller in Portland last year.

Both games will be played under the lights starting at 8:30 p.m. They will not be televised.

Tentative Hunting Regulations Set

Hunting regulations adopted tentatively by the game commission on July 13 would be similar to last years if given final approval after a hearing to be held on July 27 in Portland.

A buck, deer season starting on September 29 would be followed by a hunter's choice season in most of the state with the general season ending on October 21. Visible antlers would be legal in eastern Oregon. Extended hunter's choice seasons in western Oregon and 15 controlled deer hunts would add to the harvest.

The general elk season would start on October 27 and would end on November 21 except west of the Cascades where the season would end on November 12. Twenty-one controlled elk hunts would be held, implementing the commission's policy of unit elk herd management. Five thousand six hundred and seventy free permits to be used in conjunction with general elk tags would be issued for these hunts. Public drawings will be held.

Archery hunters will have nine areas available for their use. In four of these, archers would be permitted to take a deer and an elk. Two new areas, one on the Century Drive in Deschutes county and a portion of the Malheur refuge, would be opened to archers for the first time.

Antelope hunt regulations would be similar to those of 1955 with a total of 600 permits issued for the three areas.

Upland game regulations would be much the same as in 1955. The pheasant season would open on October 20 and extend to November 12 with a daily bag of three cocks. A season for chukar partridge to run concurrently with the pheasant season was opened for the first time in portions of eastern Oregon with a bag limit of three birds and six in possession. Mourning dove and band-tailed pigeon season would be September 1 to 30.

Instructions on making applications for controlled hunts will be made public immediately following adoption of final regulations on July 27.

"All Stars" String Victory Streak to 5

Cottage Grovers Lose Again, This Time to Junction

The Cottage Grove city team scored six runs in the first four innings of play at Kelly field Sunday, but went scoreless the rest of the game to lose to Junction City 11 to 6.

The Cottage Grove club bettered their opponents in hits with 10 to 9, but fared less well in the run-batted-in column. Heavy hitters for the city squad were Bill Levings who got two for five, scored a run, and collected two RBIs, and Leon Hayes who got two for three and scored one run.

Two RBIs apiece were collected by Ron Rice who had one for five and scored a run, and Buzz Wyant who pitched the first six innings and got one hit in three tries.

Junction City stars were Art Schirmer who got two for three, including a homerun, scored three runs and batted in two; and centerfielder Lynch who got two for four, scored three runs and batted in one.

Junction City scored three runs on three hits in the first inning. After one out, Lynch got a double and scored on a single by Drongeson. Schirmer was walked and both men scored when Mortenson singled and an error was scored against the Cottage Grove catcher.

Cottage Grove was scoreless until the second inning when they got two runs on three hits. After Moore grounded out, Ray Cellars got a single. Ron Rice got a one-bagger and Cellars was out going into third. Dave Day walked and both runners advanced on a sacrifice by Hayes and were scored on a single by Wyant. Carpenter popped out to retire the inning.

Junction City came back in the third with one more run when Lynch got on with a single and later scored on an error by the shortstop.

Cottage Grove made in 4-4 in the bottom of the third when Levings got on base by an error, advanced to second when Moore got on by a fielders choice (Levings who had singled earlier was caught going into third), both runners stole a base and scored when Ron Rice got on by the first baseman's error.

Junction City moved ahead two runs in the first of the fourth when Peterson singled, moved to second on a passed ball, then on a balk and scored on another passed ball. Then Struckrath, who had walked, scored when the left fielder missed Lynch's fly. Lynch was out trying to make it to second on the throw.

But Cottage Grove tied it again in their half in their last scoring effort. Hayes got on by an error, moved to second on a single by Carpenter, stole third, and scored along with Carpenter when Levings singled.

Junction City moved ahead one run on a homer by Schirmer in the fifth and stayed in front the rest of the game. They were scoreless during the sixth, seventh, and eighth innings, but their runners crossed home plate four times that last inning. The runs were scored on two singles and three errors. The winning pitcher was Walt Shimer, the loser Buzz Wyant.

Volunteer Evacuees to Leave Portland During 'Operation Alert'

At the time of the CONELRAD drill to be held throughout the nation July 20, Oregon civil defense forces will have been in full mobilization for more than a month working out the problems caused by a simulated nuclear bomb attack upon Portland, one of the nation's 76 critical target areas.

Volunteers acting as "evacuees" from Portland will be moving down Oregon roads through traffic control points, to emergency welfare centers where they will receive mass care. These groups of volunteers will range from a few hundred in some counties to an estimated 8,000 in Clackamas County where an all-out civil defense effort is being made. In some counties the volunteer "evacuees" will be fed a light snack in others they will receive a full meal.

An emergency newspaper will be published by the Canby Herald for survival information as to the nature and extent of the attack, and facts to stop spread of rumors. The Canby Herald's emergency edition will be printed after their regular press run of the week in time to be distributed to the volunteer "evacuees" as they arrive at the Canby emergency welfare center.

Governor Elmo E. Smith will participate in Operation Alert by simulating his evacuation from the capital, taking with him a kit of key material necessary for continuation of the state government. Governor Smith's action will parallel that of President Eisenhower who, with members of his staff and key governmental officials will evacuate Washington, D. C., and set up U.S. government functions some 200 miles from the nation's capital. Governor Smith will leave Salem for Canby where he will observe operation of the emergency welfare center.

The state civil defense control center in Salem will be in constant contact with all county control centers and the Federal Civil Defense Administration through its regional office in Santa Rosa, California. The OCDA control center will direct the play of the problem, making decisions in problems of traffic control; food, petroleum and medical supplies; radiological determination and control; rescue and damage control services in the stricken areas; security and policing details; and many other problems which will crop up only in the actual exercise.

Civil defense officials point out that Operation Alert 1956 is the greatest effort yet undertaken in a CD exercise, and that it is an exercise only, not a test of CD capabilities. They emphasize that no training exercise predicated on a make-believe attack could be a civil defense test any more than peace time "war games."

OTA Promoting Safety Epidemic

The Oregon Trucking Association, Inc., wants to start an epidemic of safety on the state's highways between now and Labor day.

As part of a nationwide summer safe-driving campaign, sponsored by the American Trucking association, the OTA is urging Oregon's tens of thousands of professional drivers to "Set the Pace for Safety" during the highway travel months of July, August and September.

The "safety-pace" slogan already is appearing on thousands of truck bumpers and is being posted in terminals, shops and other places where drivers gather, according to OTA President Vince Eggleston.

"Safe driving is contagious," said Eggleston, "and we want to see the state's professional drivers start an epidemic of safety this summer."

They can do this, he said, by setting good highway safety and courtesy examples themselves.

"When one driver does a good job, others following behind tend to copy. This is especially true in the case of the truck driver because many non-professionals figure that he knows the ropes and they copy his every move and maneuver."

Eggleston called for observance of this five-point "pace-setting" program:

1. Set your speed according to conditions and the law.
2. Don't pass unless there's not the slightest possibility of danger.
3. Don't tailgate; leave plenty of room between your vehicle and the one ahead for emergency stops and to make passing easier for others.
4. Drive defensively.
5. Let faster traffic pass by pulling as far to the right as possible.
