Roundup Stages Western Dances

EUGENE (SPECIAL) — Tex Williams and his 12 piece western dance band will play for two dances at the Emerald Empire Roundup here August 3-5, according to Jaycees and Eugene police, co-sponsors of the annual benefit Roundup.

Both dances will be at the auditorium building at Lane County Fairgrounds, beginning at 9 p.m. Friday and Saturday, August 3 and 4. Tickets will be on sale at the door, or may be bought in advance at Roundup headquarters in the lobby of the Eugene Hotel. Also available at headquarters are box, reserved and grandstand seats to the rodeo performances Friday and Saturday nights and Sunday afternoon.

In addition to the dances and rodeos, the Roundup will feature two buckaroo breakfasts at the fairgrounds Saturday and Sunday from 7 to 11 a.m., a free beef barbecue at the fairgrounds beginning at 6 p.m. Thursday, August 2, and a combined junior and grand parade Saturday, August 4, at 1:30 p.m.

Free parade entry blanks may be picked up at headquarters or by writing Emerald Empire Roundup, Eugene Hotel, Eugene, Oregon. Parade entries are already coming in. Cash prizes for both the junior and adult portions of the parade are being offered winners.

Roundup headquarters will be open from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Saturday and hours will be extended a few days before the Roundup.

The Cisco Kid (Duncan Renaldo) will be the star attraction at the Roundup, and will present a special show at each rodeo as well as making appearances at all Roundup events.

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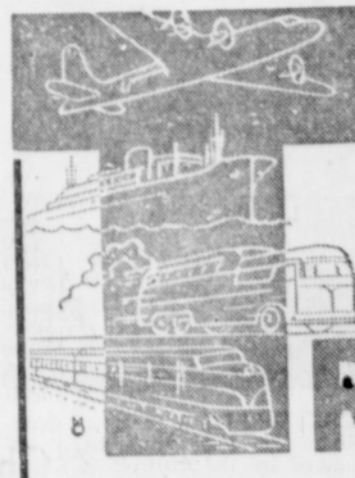

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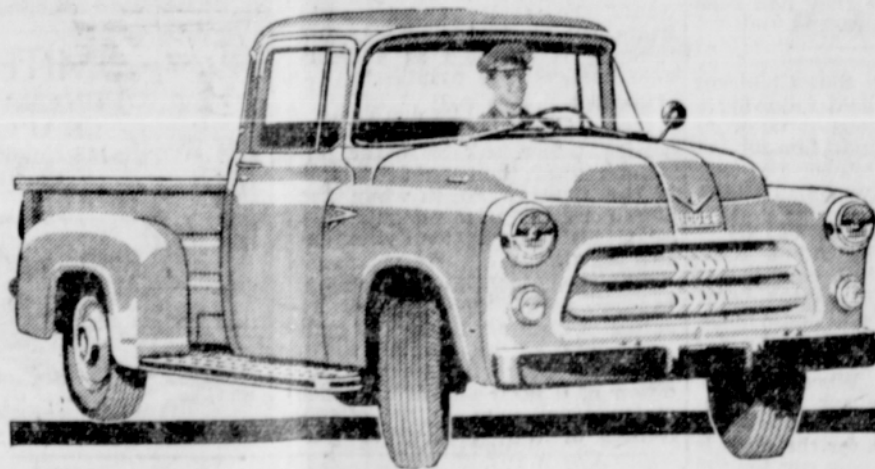
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
