

Game Commission To Again Discuss Ten Mile Lake

In response to numerous requests, rehabilitation of the Ten Mile lakes system will again be brought up for consideration at the game commission's next meeting at 3 p.m. Friday, July 27, it was announced today. The meeting will be at the commission's Portland headquarters, 1634 S. W. Alder.

The decision to review the Ten Mile lake treatment was reached after the receipt of many letters from interested persons and a request from the Coos Bay Chamber of Commerce for a hearing on the rehabilitation.

If the commission decides to activate the project, first consideration will be given to the treatment of Eel lake which will then be used as a rearing area for downstream migrant silver salmon, steelhead and cutthroat trout. The Eel lake treatment would take place about a year prior to the treatment of the Ten Mile lakes watershed.

Eugene added three more runs in the fifth and another pair in the sixth inning. Leon Hayes relieved Wyant on the mound in the seventh and held the Eugene club scoreless on two hits for the final two innings.

The first Grove run came in the sixth inning, when Bob Moore singled, took second on Don Tonole's hit, went on to third when Ray Cellars hit into a fielders choice and scored when the Eugene first baseman committed an error. In the eighth inning, Hayes, Moore and Tonole hit consecutive singles and Cellars sacrificed Hayes home to give the Groves their second and final run.

Hayes, Moore and Tonole led the local hitters with two hits for four times at bat apiece. Cellars was credited with the only run batted in.

All during the last week and the weekend the fishing was very good off the Coos Bay bar and inside. Everyone has been taking their limit during the past week, of big Chinook and Silvers.

Notice: This is to remind all of you sport fishermen that when you purchase a fishing license that you will be given a salmon steelhead punch card. Punch this card after catching your salmon. This is the only way that the State Game commission can tell how many salmon are caught each year by sport fishermen. This card must be returned to the game commission before February 15, 1947. Don't forget to punch your card.

Weather: Good, wind west to northwest with patches of morning fog, but clearing in the afternoon. The weather in the interior of the state has been so very hot. Why don't you come down our way and cool off?

Bar: Good for the past week. Salmon: Chinook, very good. Everyone is getting their limit. Silvers: Very good. They are being caught right on the bar and outside.

Striped Bass: They are good on the low tides in the area around the railroad bridge in the bay.

Ten-Mile Lake: Plenty of perch. Crabs: Fair. Clams: The tides will be fair for this weekend. Bottom fish: Very good in the lower bay around the entrance and off the rocks along the coast. More than 20 cars from the Cottage Grove Jalopy association competed in the first regular jalopy race at the Jaycee race track Sunday. A previous exhibition race had been held as a part of the July 4 festivities at the track, but the race Sunday was the first of regular bi-weekly competition.

Hot weather sent the spectators scurrying to concession stands between each of the thrill-packed races, but everybody held their seats during each event so not close calls on the track.

Many jalopies were involved in collisions, some crashed into the bushes around the track and one sent a tire and wheel into the creek that separates the Jaycee track from the Western Oregon Exposition fairgrounds. There were enough thrills to keep the spectators hopping up and down all through the races.

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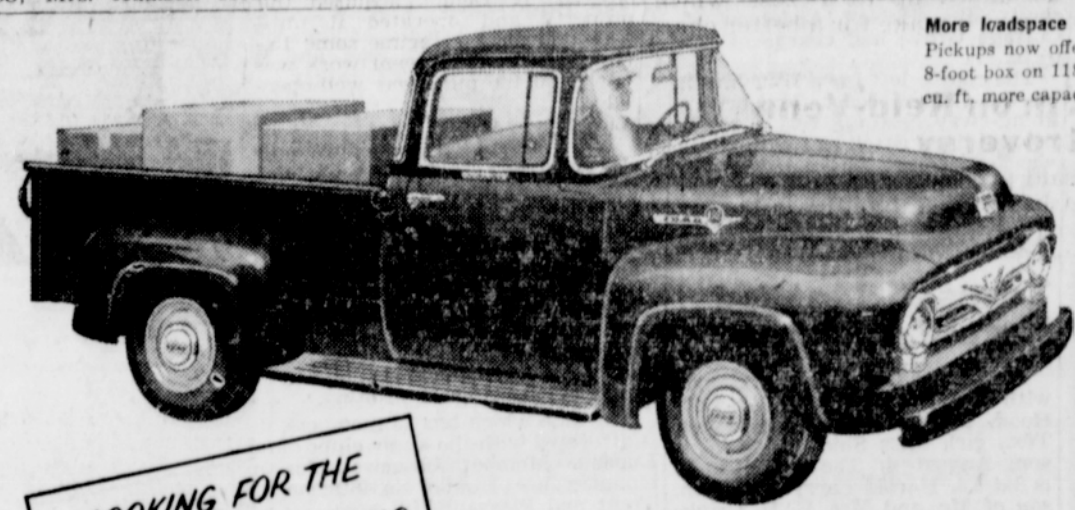
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
