### A Summer Food Suggestion

July and summer day heat call for inspired thinking on the part of the household menu-maker. It is very important during these months that the food you prepare be light, so that your family won't have that heavy, lazy feeling. Yet, in making your meals you must also have them well balanced so that they will contain all the energy and vitality your family needs. Remember to keep summer cooking light, but hearty. A basic diet of Oregon wheat foods is especially good in furnishing needed energy. Another good idea is to plan your main course meal in advance so that you can prepare it during the cool of the morning and have it ready to go when meal time rolls around.

One treat that is bound to score high on the family list of favorites is light and crisp, golden cream puffs. Stuffed with fresh fruit, whipped cream or ice cream this is a summer treat that everyone loves. There's no great magic in making these tender shells—just follow the recipe carefully. This is one case where it is very important to follow the recipe to the letter.

### CREAM PUFFS

1 cup water  
1/2 cup butter or margarine  
1 cup sifted enriched flour  
Dash of salt  
4 eggs  
Whipped cream  
Bring water to a boil. Add butter, stirring until melted. Add flour and salt together. Stir well until mixture is smooth and forms a soft ball that does not separate.

Cool mixture slightly. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Drop batter on lightly greased baking sheet to make 10 puffs. Bake in 425 degree oven for 15 minutes. Reduce heat and bake in moderate oven 350 degrees about 25 minutes longer. When cool, fill with whipped cream and sprinkle with confectioners' sugar.

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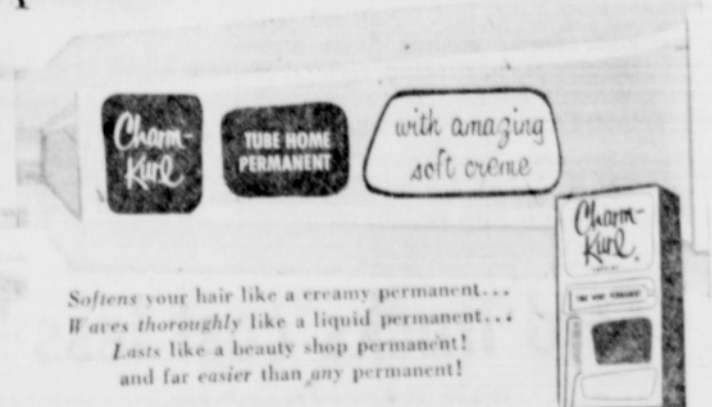
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
