Children near the Silk Creek grade school have found another way to occupy these long summer afternoons. For one hour each Thursday afternoon they attend a story hour at the home of Mrs. Ernest Darnell.

Mrs. Darnell started the story hour about a month ago and has had as many as 14 neighborhood children at one session. They come to her home and if it is warm, meet in the yard to hear the stories. They also have a singing session and have organized a rhythm band.

Mrs. Darnell tells varying types of stories and sometimes reads to them. She tries to pick, she says, those that are entertaining and at the same time character building.

Logging Siltation Damaging to Fish

Logging siltation has caused serious damage to the fish population of the south fork of Salmonberry river in Clatsop county. Evidence of this has been obtained by Ralph Swan, fishery biologist for the game commission.

Working on the stream recently Swan found that on a branch subjected to prolonged and excessive siltation, the few fish present were in poor condition and that there were no fish of this year's hatch. On a nearby unlogged branch he found cutthroat and steelhead of three age groups including many young fish hatched this year.

These findings parallel evidence obtained by the commission two years ago on the Powder river in eastern Oregon except that mining pollution was responsible in that case.

Swan said in reporting his findings, "It is quite obvious that the heavy silt load smothered out the fish food organisms and probably killed fish eggs in the gravel. A change in logging practices could have prevented such damage."
