Bill Hesse Now Evinrude Motor Dealer for Area

With boasting one of the most popular outboard recreations in the country," Mr. Hesse said, "we are especially happy to be chosen as the Evinrude dealer in this area. The quality and dependability of Evinrude motors are well known. Since 1908, when Ole Evinrude produced the first practical mass produced outboard motor, this company has been the most respected in the industry."

This year's line, according to Mr. Hesse, incorporates a model for every type of power requirement. There are now nine Evinrude motors, ranging from three to 30 horsepower. Three of the new motors are 30 horsepower units; the deluxe Lark and the standard and electric-starting Big Twins. They supplant Evinrude's former 25 horsepower units. Trek Outing Profits To Aid Shriners Hospital Funds

A total of 380 children were hospital patients at the Shriners Hospital for Crippled Children in Portland this past year.

The 380 patients were hospitalized for an average of 80 days. Sixty-nine children went to the hospital for poliomyelitis treatment. Another 79 had congenital abnormalities.

The Mary's Peak Trek helps pay part of the cost of operating this medical center for children. The Trek is sponsored by the Shrine clubs of Benton, Lincoln, Linn and Polk counties.

The Trek has been set for August 5 this year. It is an all-day family outing at Mary's Peak, highest mountain in the coast range, which is in Siuslaw national forest.

A religious observance at 11:30 a.m. will begin Trek day. Lunch will be at noon. Barbecued sandwiches and soft drinks may be purchased at the Trek. An air show, vaudeville acts, special acts for children and Shrine musical groups make up the entertainment. Of the 380 patients at the Shrine hospital last year, 28 were admitted from the four-sponsoring counties. Six came from Benton; 14 from Linn, five from Lincoln and 3 Polk.

Some 3,093 patient visits were made at the out patient department and another 7,304 patient visits were made to the physical therapy department, according to Charles Biddle, Trek manager. Annual operating cost of the Portland unit is approximately \$300,000. This does not include the monetary value of the many donations of food, services and other essential supplies.

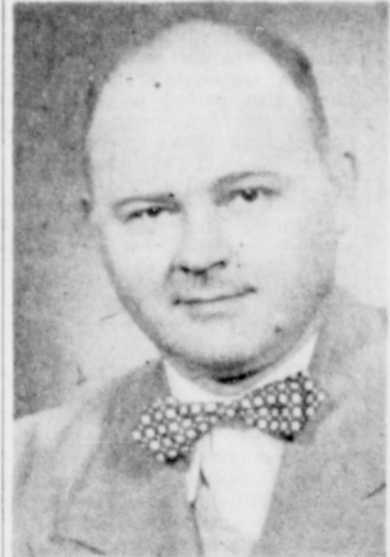
