

Cottage Grove Team Runs Loss Record to Ten Straight

It took an extra inning this time, but the final result was the same old story: Cottage Grove loses again.

After nine innings of well-played tied baseball, the Cottage Grove city team was smothered in the 10th inning by a five run rally on the part of Albany. The final score was 7 to 2. This was the 10th straight loss for Cottage Grove.

The big question now is "Will Cottage Grove win a game this season?" There is no hope that they can escape last place, but will they go through the entire season winless? They only have two more chances. Next Sunday they will play Junction City there and the following week Eugene here.

Last Sunday's game held at Kelby field was a heart breaker. The Albany team was held to two runs on five hits until the 10th inning. Then two singles, a home-run, a walk, a double and another single produced five more runs for Albany to cinch the game. Cottage Grove was able to do nothing in their half.

Cottage Grove's lone runs came in the third inning. Carpenter walked, Levins got on by an error and both were knocked in by a double by Cellers. That was the extent of Cottage Grove scoring.

The only other Cottage Grove hits in the game came with a single by Carpenter in the first and a single by Moore in the ninth. Eight Grove players were struck.

Big Game Drawing Deadline August 7

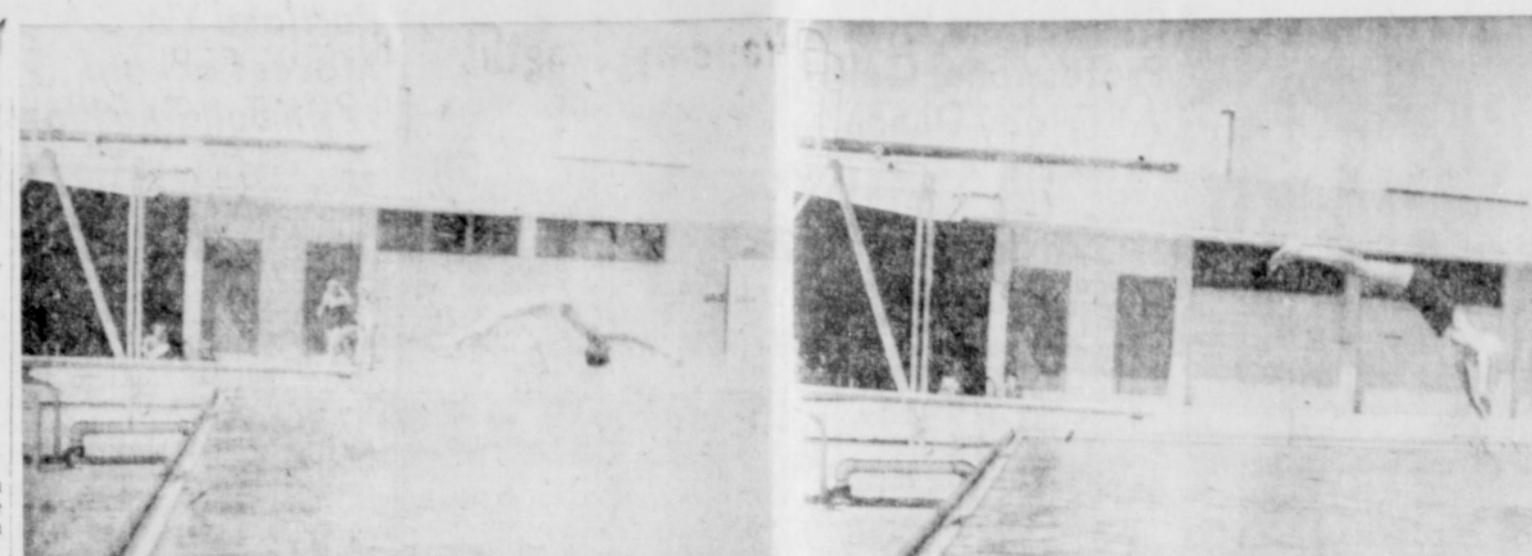
Big game hunters who wish to participate in the antelope and early deer and elk hunts should submit their applications immediately to the word from the Oregon Game Commission. Application blanks are now available at all license agencies, game commission regional offices, and the Portland headquarters, 1634 S. W. Alder. Deadline for submitting applications for these early August and September hunts is 5 p.m. August 7. Public drawings will be held on August 1 beginning at 10 a.m. The antelope season is set for September 1 through September 5 with 200 permits issued for each of the three antelope areas. Each permit validates the taking of one buck antelope during the hunt. A fee of \$5 must accompany all applications.

Hap Wolfard Shoots 77, Places in State Meet

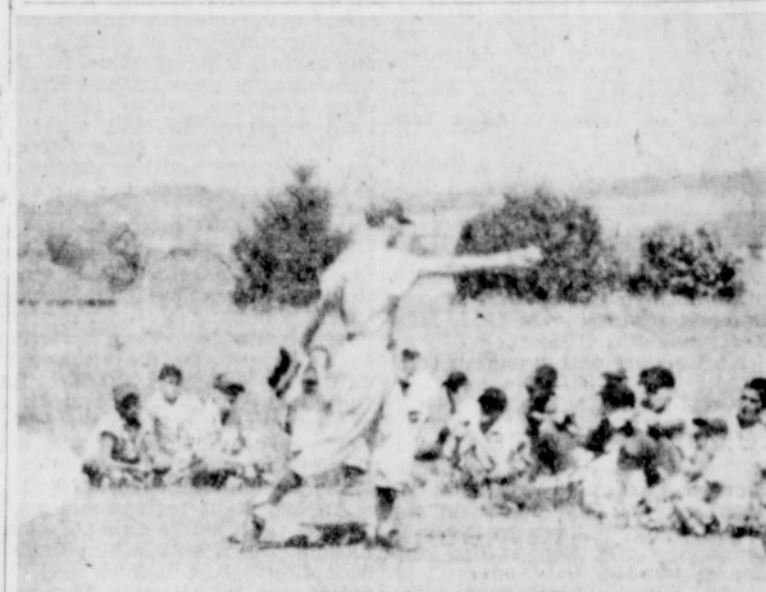

Salmon Salvaged In Tenmile Lake

The Tenmile Lake Sportsmen's Association and the Oregon State Game Commission recently combined forces to accomplish a sizeable job of salmon salvage in the Tenmile lakes area.

Up to the present time 31,000 young silver salmon have been rescued from potholes and released into the larger stream flows of the Tenmile lakes system. The group is now working on Big and Benson creeks, the last tributary streams to receive attention.

Most of the work is being done by the fish salvage committee of the Tenmile Lake Sportsmen's group assisted by Bill Saltzman, game commission fishery biologist.
