Sandwiches Good Hot Weather Food

Flights of the imagination aren't confined to salads and casseroles. Sandwich making can be equally creative, declares Mrs. Nancy (W. E.) Riley, Lane agent in home economics.

"Dagwood has been our best proponent of really nourishing sandwiches," she said. "All cooks can take a tip from his combinations and wide choice of breads."

To give all cooks a "break" from the kitchen, August was selected as national sandwich month. But this doesn't mean the family will be poorly fed, Mrs. Riley emphasized. A well-planned sandwich can be a full meal in itself.

A variety of 35 sandwich fillings is suggested in the leaflet, "Let's Make Sandwiches," available from the Lane County Extension Service by calling DI 5-8418. Sandwiches can be improved by creaming the butter until it spreads easily. Butter whipped with cream or milk can be doubled in volume. A bit of greenery—lettuce, shredded cabbage, raw spinach, endive, young kale, parsley, watercress, even dandelion greens—will pep up a sandwich and add vitamins.

"And don't be afraid to taste. The best sandwich fillings are the results of adding a bit of this seasoning and that seasoning for the flavor you want," she concluded.

Portland YWCA Moves Forward With Building Plans

In February, the Portland YWCA advertised widely for "an angel" to lend them money enough to build the much-needed YWCA building. Additional funds were necessary because campaign goals over the past years had not been reached and building costs had risen steadily through the years.

And, now without fanfare, "an angel" who insists upon remaining anonymous has appeared with a gift of \$70,000 for the new building, with the provision that the money is available only if the building is started before midnight, December 31, 1956. This stipulation was made to spur the project along and get it started without further delay.

The YWCA building fund dates back to 1945 when the members of the organization instructed the board of directors to take necessary steps toward securing a new and modern building to replace the then already outworn and hazardous structure, which had long been outgrown. In 1946, the S. W. Third and Main Streets was purchased and has continued as an income-producing parking lot.

The planned five-story, brick building with basement will give the YWCA far more usable space than the present building. Storage space, plumbing and openings between rooms have been arranged so as to provide the utmost in multi-purpose use of all space for the hundreds of club and class and group meetings and the many community organizations who use the YWCA each year.

An important recreational asset will be the tiled roof of the gymnasium, which with a simple outdoor fireplace, will lend itself to many uses for all ages. This roof opens off a large room, designed for part-time use of the noon girls, popular for business girls who bring their lunches from home and buy soup, milk, tea or coffee. Sun bathing will be an attraction during the noon hour. This total indoor and outdoor space can be combined for summer evening activities of larger groups.

Hotel and residence rooms for 45 girls will be located on the fourth and fifth floors. A large room, equipped with several individual kitchenettes and dinette units, will enable permanent residents to prepare their own meals if they choose. Adjoining the living space of the residence will be two small dining or meeting rooms, which may be scheduled by girls for personal entertaining.

Canning Time Now at Hand

Fill up your empty fruit jars and enjoy good eating all winter, says Mrs. Nancy (W. E.) Riley, Lane agent in home economics. "Canning is a time-old custom for making possible a variety of delicious foods throughout the winter and of reducing the cost of living," she said.

But home canning, she added, should be limited to those foods that cannot be preserved successfully by less costly or less laborious methods. Winter gardens, winter storage, preserving by freezing involve less labor than canning. Salting, curing, and drying are often less expensive. But for some foods—such as tomatoes, pears, prunes, fruit purees, peaches, and sauerkraut—canning cannot be excelled.

"Home Canning" prepared by Thomas Onsdorff and Agnes Kolshorn, Nutritionists with Oregon State extension service, is an "answer all" booklet on canning.
