Localites Shine at County 4-H Fair in Eugene

Local 4-H Club Members Capture Many Lane County 4-H Fair Awards

Local kids took their share of ribbons and prizes at the Lane County 4-H Fair held in Eugene last week.

One of the biggest honors went to Dean Olson of Creswell who had the grand champion steer. Dean's steer took two blue ribbons, one in judging and one in showmanship.

Dean's Black Angus weighed 980 pounds. At the Wednesday night auction, he sold him for \$352.80, the largest amount paid for any of the auctioned stock. Dean attends Pleasant Hill school where he will be in the eighth grade this fall.

Another Pleasant Hill student to win a blue ribbon was 12-year-old Susan Swift. Her 100 pound sheep won a blue ribbon and took a good price at the auction.

Additional Creswell students to take stock ribbons include Dennis Triola, a third place ribbon for a 160 pound steer; Brad Berg, a blue ribbon for an 800 pound steer; Jerry Olson, a blue ribbon for a 1040 pound steer; Judy Olson, a blue ribbon for an 870 pound steer; John Berg, a second place ribbon for a 730 pound steer; and John Tveder, a third place ribbon for a 1000 pound steer.

A Cottage Grove boy, Eddie Hemenway, won a third place ribbon for a 740 pound steer.

"Best in Classification" prizes in other divisions went to the following local kids: Clinton Ses-

sions, Cottage Grove, electricity exhibit; Ann Taylor, Creswell, luncheon club exhibit; Ann Chapman, Cottage Grove, camp cookery; Joanne Robertson, Creswell, forestry; Zora Mae Shelley, Creswell, floriculture; Farris Lusk, Cottage Grove, homemaking; and Ann Chapman, best dress sewing.

This year's winner of a registered Holstein calf from the herd of Ralph Bender, Creswell, was Verlin Betchell, 12, Rt. 2, Creswell. Verlin, a member of the Pleasant Creek club has completed four years in the 4-H dairy project.

This year he won two blue ribbons, one for his junior cow, the other for his junior heifer cow, both Holsteins.

Ninette Lindsey, Cottage Grove, won the calf presented by the Farm Bureau to an outstanding dairy member. Choice of breed is left up to Ninette - she chose Guernsey. Ninette, a senior in Cottage Grove High school, plans to study veterinary science at Oregon State College. At this year's fair, Ninette was reserve champion in sheep showmanship, champion dairy showman in the senior division and took blue, red, and white ribbons on her Guernsey and Holstein cattle.

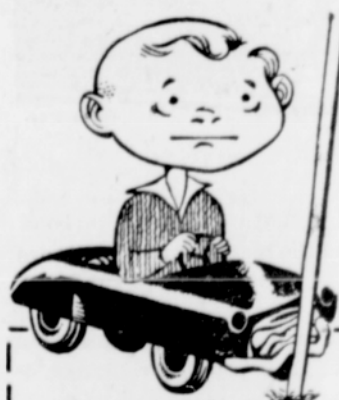
A young Cottage Grove boy, Cecil Simons, was grand champion in bachelor sewing.
