John Henry Brewer passed away Saturday, August 26, 1956, at the Silverton hospital, after having had surgery four weeks earlier.

The deceased was born in Dover, Tenn., February 24, 1873, the son of Milton and Eleanor Brewer. He came to Oregon in March, 1902, and married Louise Atwood in August, 1902. They settled in the Silver Cliff district in the Silverton area, where Mr. Brewer owned and operated a sawmill for many years. He cleared the land and had his home built from lumber from his mill. The home still stands although unoccupied.

Due to failing health, Mr. Brewer had made his home at Silverton Nursing home for the past four years and for a year previously with a daughter, Mrs. Clyde Verbeck.

Seven daughters and two sons survive: Mrs. Ray Boling, Salem; Mrs. Verbeck and Floyd Brewer, Silverton; Mrs. Jack Moore, Eureka, Calif.; Mrs. Weldon Cotterson, Salem; Mrs. Hugh and Betty, Winston; Mrs. Bruce Lockland, Bell, Calif.; and Don Brewer, Cottage Grove. The latter two are twins.

Two brothers and a sister also survive: Jack Brewer, Sacramento, Calif.; George Brewer, Silverton, and Francis Richards, Lone Pine, Calif. There are 11 grandchildren surviving and two great-grandchildren as well as several nieces and nephews. A baby daughter, passed away in 1916 and a son in 1936. Mrs. Brewer died in 1938.

Mr. Brewer's sister and brother-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Martin Phillips, now deceased, owned and operated a restaurant in Cottage Grove for several years.

Funeral services were conducted Tuesday at Ekman's Funeral home at Silverton. Mr. Brewer was laid to rest in the Silverton cemetery.

## 10,000 Veterans Study at OSC Under GI Bill

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Some 10,050 World War II veterans attended Oregon State college under the original GI bill of rights that expired in July for almost all World War II servicemen, a college tabulation reveals.

At present, only three World War II veterans still have study time eligibility left under the federal bill, the tabulation shows. They come under a special provision for veterans who enlisted or re-enlisted between October 1945 and October 1946.

The peak veteran enrollment at OSC was in 1945-47 when 4895 students were studying under GI bill benefits. Two of every three students on the OSC campus were returned servicemen that year.

The advanced guard of the soldier-turned-student group came in 1944-45 with the registration of the first 129 veterans.
