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Oregon Has Bright Prospects For Attracting New Industries

Oregon has a bright future in the development of new industries, Alan R. Mellis, with the industries department of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, told members of the local chamber here Tuesday noon. Mellis, who was the guest speaker at the noon luncheon, said new industries for the state had increased 101 percent since 1939.

So far the metropolitan area of Portland may have gotten more than its share of new industries, but the modern trend favors the smaller communities he said. More effort should be directed toward getting greater diversification, since most of the industry so far is connected with wood working, he said.

In naming some of the possible new industries for the state, the speaker related that there was no furniture plant on the Pacific where wood of the furniture is made. While the state now has nine hardwood plants, more could be utilized where there are large saw mills.

While transportation costs have hindered development of many raw products in the fruit and vegetable lines, there are good possibilities of expansion of the canning and freezing of fruits and vegetables and in the making of jams and jellies. There is also an opportunity for development of an assembly for all types of farm machinery.

Since the state has lots of good water available, there is no reason for lack in the development of rayon and cellophane, both products of the chemical industry. There are no facilities close for the manufacture of plate glass, nor the manufacture of matches.

While the Portland stock yards handle much livestock and is one of the largest on the coast, there

has never been an attempt made to manufacture leather and all hides are sent out of the area for tanning. Statistics reveal that there are 300 new industrial firms in the state each employing more than 50 people.

There is no short cut method to use in attracting new industry to the area. Such efforts require patience and hard work. Often it takes up to 10 or 12 years to land a new industry once a start has been made. Surveys made in 1954 of a number of industries contemplating expansion indicated that most would prefer to stay out of the metropolitan area and that subsidies offered in the form of locations, taxes, etc., meant little where the communities under consideration were about equal in opportunities.

The four greatest industry getters were listed in the following order: Railroads, utilities, chambers of commerce, banks. Most brochures listing the advantages of the community are a waste of money except in some special cases.

Of the 24 factors considered in choosing a location, the No. 1 factor was the available market to the product manufactured.

Newlywed Couple In Road Mishap

The pickup, which was moving household supplies and wedding gifts to Eugene, struck the shoulder of the road, skidded some 80 feet and rolled over, coming to rest on its side. The young couple's injuries were not serious.

Lane County Fair Opened in Eugene For 5-Day Run

The doors opened at 9 a.m. Wednesday, September 12, for the annual Lane County fair, which will be held through Sunday at the Pioneer park fair grounds in Eugene.

Every inch of display space was sold, according to Halie Huntington, fair manager. Several huge new buildings have also been filled.

Season tickets for the fair went on sale Monday at the fair office at \$1.50. Individual admissions will be 75 cents for adults, 25 cents for children over six, and children six and under free if accompanied by adults.

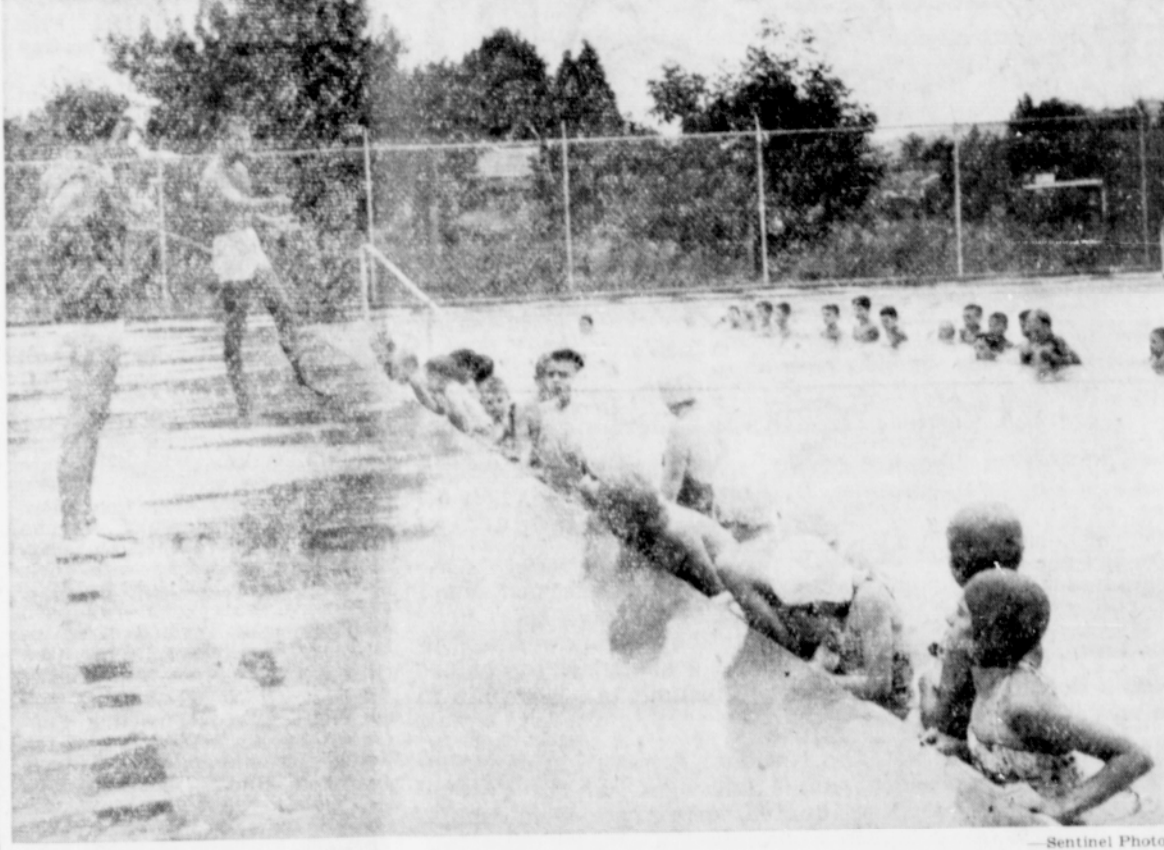
Special attractions at the five-day fair this year will include the largest carnival ever to play at the fair, a trailer village, a barnstorming helicopter, and the new Pioneer hall and barns.

Wednesday was Pioneer Day at the fair. Other designated days are Eugene Day on Thursday, Lane County day on Friday, and Family day on Sunday.

One of the biggest attractions at the fair this year will be a free show, drawing on top variety acts from the Pacific Northwest. This show will be presented on a \$75,000 portable stage in front of the grandstand at 2 p.m. and 8 p.m. Wednesday through Saturday, and at 2 p.m. on Sunday. All persons paying admission to the fair will see the show free. Acts include clown acts, a diving act, juggling, tumbling, music and other entertainment.

Some re-arrangement of exhibits has been made this year because of old buildings which have been torn out, and new buildings going in. In the new barns at the south edge of the grounds will be dairy cattle, poultry, rabbits, and milk goats. Part of the connecting area between the barns will be used for a show ring. Pioneer hall will house the art department, industrial arts, hobbies and collectibles, a restaurant, and an organ exhibit.

Parking and management of grounds will be handled by the Lane County Sheriff's Reserve, and policing of the grounds by the Lane County Sheriff's posse.

Surplus Deer Tags Plentiful

ATTENTION NIMRODS! Applications for surplus deer tags for the eleven controlled deer seasons have now been thrown open to all comers the Oregon Game Commission announced today. And there are plenty left for those who want them.

Following the September 4 deadline, none of the controlled deer hunt areas were oversubscribed, the commission said. No drawing will be held on the applications already received, and all persons filing, barring discrepancies, will receive tags for the hunt.

The surplus tags are available to any resident hunter who files an application on the first come, first serve basis, subject to the following regulations:

1. No issues will be made until seven (7) days following the advertised closing date (September 4), and if at that time the number of applicants exceeds the number of surplus tags, a second drawing will be held of only the late applicants.

2. No person may be issued more than one controlled season tag for any one area nor more than three (3) controlled deer season tags in the aggregate.

Nimrods who hold controlled deer tags for the early deer hunts, whether successful or not, can re-apply for additional tags, and persons who have already applied for the early hunts can also put in for tags as long as the applications are for different areas than the one for which they have a tag.

Since the surplus tags have become available, nimrods have an opportunity to take four deer if they wish. One of course on their regular season deer tag and the others by applying for the surplus tags in three different controlled deer areas.

The Malheur controlled area at the closing date had only 538 applicants for the 2,500 tags authorized, 129 applicants for the 150 tags in the Pleasant Ridge area, 1,041 applicants for the 1,500 tags in the Silver Lake area, 34 applicants for 500 tags at Lookout Mountain, 92 applicants for 200 tags at Pine Grove, 215 applicants for the 800 tags at Swan Lake, 58 applicants for the 200 tags at Newbridge, and 144 applicants for 300 tags at Jordan Creek.

Most surprising is the lack of interest in the Northside John Day units and the Spray area where hunters had such tremendous success last year. The Northside I area had only 169 applicants at the closing date with 1,500 tags available and the Northside II area only 74 persons applied with 1,500 tags available. In the Spray area 115 persons have applied with 1,000 tags available.

Merchants Plan Special Events For Local Stores' Fall Opening

The Cottage Grove fall opening will get under way Thursday evening, September 13, with special buys in the stores and festivities in the streets.

All Cottage Grove merchants will keep their stores open at least until 8 p.m. Thursday evening and will feature specially-priced merchandise. The fall-opening bargains will continue through Saturday.

A grab bag sale will be held beginning at 7 p.m. on Main street. More than 100 uniformly wrapped boxes containing merchandise valued at \$2 and more will go on sale for 50 cents.

Most of the items will be useful, such as shoes, shirts, ties, pencil sets and the like. However, a few boxes will contain comical items such as over-sized bloomers.

Exchange Auction
If a buyer is unsatisfied with his purchase, he may exchange it at an exchange auction to be conducted by Art Weinbaum. The auction will be conducted across the street and concurrently with the grab bag sale.

The items sold in the grab bag are not returnable to the merchant. They may be exchanged at the auction or given away. All of the items have been donated by town merchants. Proceeds from the sale will go to the retail fund.

Band to Play
In addition to the fun festivities, the Cottage Grove high school band will be on hand to add band music to the excitement.

The streets will be decorated with colored banners and store windows will carry out the fall opening theme.

The fall opening festivities have been planned by the Chamber of Commerce under the sponsorship of the town merchants, to attract the people of the community to the stores which will spotlight various merchandise for fall opening specials.

Oct. 6 Is Deadline For Registration

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Telephone Rates Go Up in Oregon

Increases in telephone rates averaging less than 1 1/2 cents a month per telephone on a state-wide basis are part of the new schedules filed in Salem Friday by Pacific Telephone and Telegraph with Charles Heltzel, Oregon public utilities commissioner, according to Cottage Grove Manager, C. W. Hawkins.

Under the new schedules Cottage Grove telephone users would pay 15c to 30c more per month for residence service. Business service rates would go up from 30c to \$1.25 a month. In Portland, F. A. Dresslar, vice president and general manager, said, "Our earnings on operations within Oregon have fallen well below the earnings of other business. This has happened because wage payments, state and local taxes and the cost of adding new telephones have risen over the past three years while telephone prices have remained at the same level since the 1953 rate adjustment."

The company, he said, has continued to push its expansion and improvement program throughout the state despite the higher costs. The 1956 construction program, largest in the company's history, will total \$30,000,000—82 per cent more than was spent on telephone construction in 1953.

"We've come a long way in telephone progress in the past few years. We can pledge even greater advancement in the years to come if we can improve our earnings and expand with Oregon as it grows," Dresslar declared.
